275 Blood Donors Yesterday At S'side; 300 Needed Today

Summerside's new Civic Centre was quickly converted into a blood donor clinic yesterday when about 90 donors were in attendance at the afternoon session and another 170 during the evening hours. Since the objective for the day was 275 the results were some 15 short of the expected number. This means that 300 donors will be required at today's sessions in order that Summerside may keep pace with the record established by the other centers in Prince County in which clinics have been held this week.

AMHERST (CP) - An estimated 90 per cent of driving decisions are based on vision. E. B. "If poor vision accounted for only five per cent of our nation's annual traffic toll... it would mean a saving of hundreds of lives, 7,000 injuries and \$25,000,000 every year."

Encounter In Painsville, O.

J.A. MacKenzie has returned from a trip that took him to Toronto, Orillia and Newmarket, Ont., Painsville, Ohio and New York. Having friends or relatives at all these points, he claims there was never a dull day. One page of his diary tells of his greatest thrill. "Two days ago I discovered Bob Soules, a middle age lawyer. His mother being Jessie Lee, my brother-in-law's sister. I expressed a wish to meet him. My wish was granted when we met in his home, where we talked, drank coffee, ate cookies and ice cream. I told him that his voice just suited me. 'You are like your Uncle Will, you take a good mouthful.' We next talked of his grandfather, Nelson Lee, whose books I had been reading. I said, 'That man was a poet and artist of no mean ability, as well as a devout Christian.' He replied, 'And you must consider the handicap under which he worked, he wrote and suffered with arthritis then called rheumatism, composed poetry and executed artistic design on every leaf. He wrote his own life story which took in the Civil War.'"

O'Leary Tops Blood Bank

O'Leary kept up the record established at the three previous Prince County Red Cross Blood Donor clinics by chalking up 178 donors on an objective of 165 at Tuesday night's session held at the O'Leary school. As at the other 3 clinics, many of the donors, were in attendance for the first time. This clinic was organized under the leadership of Mrs. T.H. MacWilliam and Mrs. L.G. Dewar who received the utmost co-operation from many different organizations in O'Leary and the surrounding districts. Sufficient voluntary assistants on hand to help the mobile team included representatives of the O'Leary Women's Institute who also furnished the refreshments, and members of the O'Leary High School Red Cross and the school's social club. Residents of Summerside and vicinity now have a challenge to maintain the record established this week at the other Prince County centres, when clinics are held Wednesday and Thursday at the Civic Auditorium in Summerside where the requirements are 550 donors.

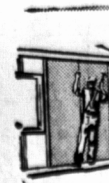
