Turkey Cream Chowder: Make 1½ qts. broth from turkey bones as usual. Remove fat. Add ½ tsp. beef granules to broth to accentuate flavor. Bring to boiling point. Add 1½ c. small-diced onion and small-diced carrots and ¼ tsp. marjoram.

Boil 20 min. or until vegetables are tender. Thicken with 2 tsp. flour stirred smooth in ¼ c. milk. Simmer 3 min.

Then add ½ (12 oz.) can drained corn kernels, 1 c. milk and ½ c. cream or undiluted evaporated milk. Bring almost to boil.

Garish with minced fresh parsley. Accompany with cornmeal crisps.
