Joseph A. Flaherty, 41, former convict who wed Frances McKeeney from a Pease River, Alta., is reported near death after being struck by a car in Quincy, Mass. Wednesday night. Flaherty and his bride are shown in this picture made when he was released from Walpole State Prison April 3 after serving 13 years of a 36-to-46 year term for rape, robbery and a.s.a.u.I. They became acquainted by mail after she sent him a Christmas card in prison and were married a week after his parole. There were several slips in lighting cues, but for the most part the operation was efficient. The set was "nice," but could have been "prettier." There were a number of slips in lines, but "recoveries were good, all unnoticeable to the audience." By the end of act one Mr. Hope-Wallace had decided that "if it would in all likelihood be an enjoyable evening," though he said he was not at all sure at first that this would be the case. Chophemone, in the person of Helen Reider, made a "sporting effort at sergeant-majorisms" and received the enthusiastic support of the audience for her part. The free for all in the "battle in which the Amazons are defeated, was

"sporting, brave, courageous— you (the audience) liked it and so did I." Two pretty maids who played at servants for the royalty were "sufficient, though perhaps they missed several chances to do larger things with their small parts."

Mr. Hope-Wallace's final comments: a production "good, clean, practical, and with gusto and bounce."

(Continued from page 10) meetings this year. Ontario tracks: 600 bet last year compared with \$26,230,828 in 1962, are making the most rapid strides. Mohawk Raceway at Campbellville, 40 miles west of Toronto, opened in 1963 and more tracks will be inaugurated this year—Garden City Raceway at St. Catharines, with a meet starting Sept. 7, and Windsor Raceway, Aug. 4.

Bellevue Carleton Raceway a few miles south of Ottawa, will have 80 nights of racing compared with 68 last year when the \$4,659,271 wagered was 34 per cent higher than in 1962.

Greenwood, where 437,560 fans wagered \$20,562,979 last year, opened March 16, followed by Mohawk May 4 and London Raceway June 15.

Ontario's richest racing event takes place Sept. 5 with the running of the Canadian Cup for \$12,000 in prize money. The Maple Leaf Stakes for a \$10,000 purse goes Aug. 29.

BIG FOL TROTTERS
The Harness Tracks of American championship series for four-year-old trotters, with \$300,850 in prize money, will have two Canadian stopovers— at Greenwood Aug. 21 for a \$10,000 purse and Blue Bonnets Oct. 4 for \$15,000.

In Nova Scotia, where betting dropped to \$3,675,989 last year from \$7,483,586, largely due to poor weather, Sackville Downs near Halifax opened May 2, earliest ever. It also decided on mile races instead of the normal distance of half a mile for early-season cards.

The track at Sydney is hoping for more business with the opening of a clubhouse and laying of a hard surface in front of the grandstand.

New Brunswick, where \$2,032,394 was wagered, a drop from \$2,061,142 in 1962, Saint John, Fredericton and Moncton tracks are hoping for a good break on the weather.

Harness racing in Manitoba and with continued night racing and the removal of tolls on the betting opportunities, the handle is growing. A total of \$1,774 was bet last year compared with \$1,152. This year there will be 18 days of racing. Carman tried parimutuel betting for the first time last year, joining Brandon and Portage la Prairie, and will continue. And Russell also expects to have betting windows for its three-day meet.

HAS MANY MEETS
Saskatchewan, with \$346,666 bet in 1963 as against \$20,179, will have meets at Regina, Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, Weyburn, Indian Head, Yorkton, Melville and Beachy.

Regina has six days of racing and Pat Lund, meet organizer, says that if operations are as successful this year, "we'll probably increase it to nine."

Calgary and Edmonton tracks, in 40 days of racing last year, handled \$5,538,022 com-
