Expanded Street Paving Program For S'side

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — A street paving program, their first in more than five years, was further expanded by the Summerside Town Council last evening. When approval was given for an expenditure in street paving, of up to \$35,000 of the \$43,000 of the additional municipal grant that will be received by the Town of Summerside. Previously the council had contracted for the paving of Harvard Street from the present pavement to the railway crossing in the east ward, for the paving of Beattie Avenue and Lidsstone Street in the center ward, and on Hawthorn Avenue in the west ward. At the special meeting of the council last evening this program was further expanded to include the paving of Victoria Road from Granville Street East to Ernest Walker's driveway in the east ward; paving of the Summer Street extension from the existing pavement north to Coronation Avenue, and continuing along Coronation Avenue from Summer Street to Granville Street, in the center ward; and paving of Cedar Street from Notre Dame Street North to Beaver Street, in the West Ward. The specifications for all these streets include grade, gravel, curb, and asphalt pavement. Tenders on these projects will close at 4 p.m., Wednesday, September 17th, with council adjourning their special meeting on the matter until that date. Prior to the meeting a delegation consisting of Frank Daley, Horace Hayes, Arnold MacLellan, Gordon Yeo, Harold Ford, Alex MacDonald, and Keith Cooke, met with the council and required that the Harvard Street paving project be extended beyond the railway crossing to connect with Water Street East. To complete the second paved entrance into Summerside from the East. Mayor W.A. Currie said it was the intention of the council to pave part of this street, as already planned, and to complete the remainder of it next year. He said the council had deemed it advisable to continue their pay-as-you-go policy on capital expenditures, and to spread the paving around as much as possible in the various areas of the town. COSTS \$10,000. Councillor W.E. MacCausland, chairman of the finance committee, said that the present paving project on Harvard Street East was costing about \$10,000, and that it would take an additional \$17,000 to provide paving and water and sewerage installations that would be required to complete the street. He pointed out that this cost would be almost half of the additional expenditure that the council could make available for the further paving program contemplated by the council this year. He said the completion of this street next year which the council had in mind for next year, and Councillor Clark added that cement was planned for this particular area. The resolutions in regard to the additional paving projects for this year were presented by Councillor Leo Wood, chairman of the street committee, and were unanimously approved by the council.

Weather Fails To Chill Enthusiasm At Exhibition

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — The 57th annual Egmont Bay and Mt. Carmel Exhibition was officially opened yesterday afternoon by his Hon. Lieutenant-Governor Walter Hyndman. Due to inclement weather which prevailed throughout the afternoon the opening was held in the main exhibition building and despite the unfavorable weather the attendance was large. Lieutenant-Governor Hyndman paid a special tribute to the women for their display of handicraft work which he said was the best he had ever seen. Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., complimented the directors on their foresight in erecting a new swine building. He said he was hopeful that by the time next year rolled around that all the roads leading to the fair grounds would be paved. He also paid tribute to the women of their handicraft display and exhorted them to continue to preserve their Acadian heritage in the respect. Hon. Eugene Cullen, minister of agriculture, speaking on behalf of the Premier of the Province, pointed out that the aim of such exhibitions is to improve the quality of their livestock and he said, the improvement shows each year in this district would indicate the real value of such rural exhibitions. Mr. Walker Shaw, former deputy minister of agriculture, complimented the directors on erecting their new hog building but he pointed out that more such buildings were necessary. He said that in the horse class the quality of the animals was never more pronounced. All he said, were in top shape and in this present day when horses seem to be gradually disappearing from the farm scene this was an excellent indication. Mr. Henry Wedge, directed his remarks to the sheep exhibitors and presented considerable information of value to this particular branch of farming. The milking contest, always a crowd pleaser at the exhibition, was closely contested, and in the 16 year and under class, Ivan Cormier of St. Phillip, placed first, with Robert Arsenault of Abrams Village second. In the adult class, Pierre Paul Gallant of Mont Carmel came first, with Louis Cormier of St. Phillip a close contender. Paul Bernard of St. Phillip with his team of horses won first place in the weight pulling contest, and second prize went to the team of Joseph Gallant, Abrams Village. Top poultry winners were Bruce Small of Miscouche Anthony Gallant of Egmont Bay and John Small of Miscouche. Horse and cattle classes were fairly well filled and in the opinion of the judges were on a par with other years. In the ladies work division Mrs. Gus P. Arsenault of Abrams Village took first prizes, Mrs. Sylvia Arsenault six firsts, and Mrs. Felix J.N. Gallant six firsts. DOMESTIC SCIENCE First place winners in the domestic science class were Mrs. Edmund Bernard, St. Phillip; Mrs. Victorian Arsenault, St. Chrysostom, and Mrs. Gus P. Arsenault of Abrams Village.

Complaints Aired That Spray Killing Partridge, Pheasants

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — Complaints that potato sprays have been killing partridge, pheasants and even livestock, were aired at a meeting of the Prince County branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Association here last night. As a result of discussion on the subject, a query was advanced as to whether the manufacturer of this type spray, which reportedly has an arsenic base, could use another type base which would prove less deadly. Association members showed concern over the problem. The meeting was held at the Civiv Building with president Frank Howatt presiding. Also discussed were the stream improvements with the construction of the fish ladder at the Bedouge Pond taking up much of the time. It was decided that volunteers would assemble a week Monday evening to work on the project which is certain to enhance fishing in that particular stream. It was revealed that between 75 and 100 pheasant will be released shortly at various points east of Central Street in which area the season will be open this fall for shooting. The western area has been given another reprieve in order to give the pheasants a further chance to reproduce which will eventually result in better shooting for the many gunners who look forward to this sport.

Supreme Court Opens At S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided at a special sitting which commenced in Supreme Court in Summerside Wednesday in an action by J. Loring Raynor, plaintiff, against Isabel Bell, William Bell, and Russell Bell, Defendants. The plaintiff is represented by George McMahon, Q.C. and Chester S. MacDonald, Q.C. while J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C. is attorney for the defendants. The action involves a claim for money lent by the plaintiff to the defendants together with interest, and for work done and materials provided by the plaintiff to the defendants at their request and for "messages and tenements of the plaintiff by the defendants," and on money paid by the plaintiff for the defendants at their request and for money found to be due from the defendants to the plaintiff on accounts stated between them. The action concerned an amount of \$2827.17, less an allowance of \$1100.00 for potatoes, leaving a balance of \$1727.17 in dispute.

Short Lobsters Bring 3 Fines

SUMMERSIDE — Three Prince County fishermen were fined in Magistrate's Court here Wednesday for possession of under-sized lobsters. A resident of Abraham's Village was fined \$17.50 and costs of \$6.00 and two residents of Urbaville paid fines of \$12.50 and costs of \$5 and costs. The case of a father and son from Cape Traverse, charged with obstructing a Fisheries officer in the discharge of his duties was adjourned until September 23rd. The charge arose from interference during the seizure of a truck and quantity of spawn and undersized lobsters at Cape Traverse.
