Nearly everybody has heard of the Pitcher plant, and the manner in which its victims are entrapped, but a more wonderful plant still is the water-plant, or Utricularia.

It has lately been discovered by a naturalist at Oxford that this plant, which has long been known to prey upon microscopic insects in their various stages, and even to feast occasionally upon minute fresh water crustaceans, also entraps and absorbs the fry of fish.

Among the wonders of nature, great and small, there are few that excel this extraordinary plant. There are several specimens of it, and they are widely distributed all over the world, and all of them are carnivorous.

In the autumn, so to speak, the buds drop off the floating weed, and falling to the bottom, there commence to throw out leaves. By-and-by the bladders develop—they are only about the ninth of an inch when full-grown—and then the plant, equipped for a predatory life, floats up towards the surface and cruises about, as the wind or the current takes it, in quest of prey.
