## Evinrudes Do It

IF anybody had told you a month ago that Cape Traverse Evinrudes would be in the Island Senior Hockey League finals, you would probably have had doubts about the sanity of the person making such an utterance.

Cape Traverse won two hockey games in a 20 game schedule and they looked mighty bad in losing the most of their tussles. Just about nobody figured there was any chance of the Cape doing anything in the playoffs. Whoever drew them were supposed to have an easy path to the finals.

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks scored four goals in the first 18 minutes of play, then had to hang on desperately to gain a 4-3 victory over New York Rangers in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The triumph, before 10,847 fans, moved the Hawks to within five points of the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs, who were idle tonight.

The Rangers dropped 30 points behind Chicago and remained only two points ahead of the fifth-place Detroit Red Wings.

Goals by Ab McDonald, Bill Hay, Bobby Hull and Ron Murphy put Chicago in front 4-0 by the 8:40 mark of the second period. But from that point on, the hustling Rangers took over.

Guy Gendron was the first Ranger to put the puck behind Chicago goalie Glenn Hall when he scored after passes by Albert Langlois and Ted Hampson at 9:52 of the second period.

Midway in the final period, Ken Schinkel beat Hall with a 10-footer and at 12:43 Earl Ingarfield beat Hall with his 21st goal of the year.

The Rangers kept pressing and had an edge in the play until 18:18 of the frame when New York defenceman Irv Spencer was sent off the ice for tripping Hull.
