The New Canadian Cardinal.

There was unusual rejoicing in Quebec when it became known that Mgr. Taschereau had received official notification of his elevation to the Cardinalate.

Congratulatory messages and telegrams poured in upon His Eminence, and the Papal and Canadian flags were hoisted at the Palace. The signal was at once understood by the citizens, and soon flags were flying from Loyal University and most of the public buildings, besides a number of private residences.

The two Houses headed by their Speakers with their masses, waited upon His Eminence and presented him with an address, and His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor paid an official visit to His Eminence.

Under the authority of an order from the Militia Department at Ottawa, a salute of 19 guns was fired from Dufferin Terrace, by a detachment of Major Crawford Lindsay's Quebec Field Battery.

Riel's Children.

It is stated that the two orphans of Riel will likely be adopted by Mgr. Tache and that he will attend to their proper education. A movement was started to have them educated in Montreal, but since the Archbishop has assumed control of them it has been dropped.

Burned to Death.

Eight persons were smothered and burned to death in a frame house, Nos. 731 and 732 South Canal street, Chicago, at 4 o'clock on the morning of the 7th. Both houses were filled with smoke, and before any occupants were aroused many of the sleepers were doubtless smothered in their beds.
