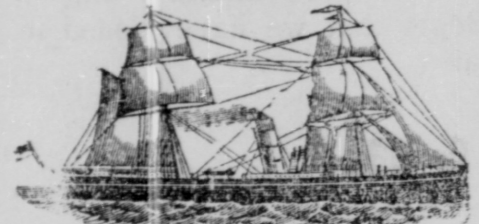

For Business Men

The Care of Wealth

As a rule it is only the man who has slowly accumulated wealth or who has been carefully trained with reference to the responsibilities that the possession of wealth entails, who can exercise such prudence and self control as to retain and increase it. This fact has long been pretty well understood, and there was formerly much truth in the homely saying that in America it is but three generations from shirtsleeves to shirtsleeves. If in the case of the Vanderbilts, the Astors and other families of great wealth this now appears to be contradicted, the cause will be found in the training which succeeding generation receives before the full weight of responsibility falls upon them. That the wealth which comes suddenly and unexpectedly commonly disappears as quickly as it came is still true. Coming suddenly, the recipient lacks the discipline which years of slow accumulation would enforce, and the training which is carefully bestowed by thoughtful parents upon those who are to inherit great estates; and lacking both self and business training, the unexpectedly rich not infrequently becomes suddenly poor again. The history of this country abounds with examples, and now another has been added to the long list in the experience of a man in Patterson, New Jersey, who was a laborer until two years ago, when he came into possession of a small fortune amounting to \$45,000. The other day, according to a news report, he paid out the last dollar of this money as a fine for being drunk and disorderly.

Prospects of War.

Henry Clews remarks: whatever may be the present aspect of war probabilities, we are bound to interpret England's purposes in the light of the fact that she has chartered 67 steamers for military service; which means that the Government is contemplating an extensive campaign; and the demand for \$40,000,000 for special war service has a like significance. It is therefore among the possibilities that an easing of the money market may be coincident with less favorable relations with the foreign financial centres. Under these circumstances, it is to be expected that large and responsible operators will act cautiously in respect to long commitments. But, at the same time, the market appears to be in a sound condition, with little in it to force much more liquidation; and it therefore is inviting to brief ventures upon the ups and downs in good stocks.

Analogous Arguments.

There is an argument used by old fogies as follows: "I don't buy goods from firms who advertise, because the fellow who advertises must increase the price to pay for his advertising." This is a parallel of the questions: Does the substitution of steamboats for sailing vessels increase the cost of carrying? Does the substitution of railroads for stage coaches increase the cost of travelling?"—Boyce's Hustler.

were launched some time ago and are nearly ready for service. The other two, called the Venerable and the Bulwark, are under construction at Chatham and Davenport. These ships are from 14,700 to 15,000 tons displacement. The London is protected with nine inch armor, the plate being carried forward and at less thickness to the bow, while the after bulkhead protection is as thick as twelve inches. She is provided with engines of 15,000 horse power and is expected to have a speed of 18 knots. These six battle ships, with fifteen other first class battle ships in the British navy, each carry four 12 inch breech loading guns. In addition the London will carry twelve 6 inch guns, eighteen twelve pounders and fourteen other quick firing guns. Her steel ram weighs by itself thirty-four tons. A ship like this carries about her four steam boats and thirteen sail and pulling boats. The British fleet of to-day, counting ships under construction, includes no less than 45 first-class battle ships and 21 armoured cruisers, and 30 other first-class cruisers. To show how new a creation this fleet is it may be mentioned that all these battle ships but eight have been launched or begun since 1890. Of the cruisers mentioned above 46 are of less than nine years old. During this year the admiralty has had under construction 12 battle ships, 16 first-class cruisers, 6 second-class cruisers, 10 third-class cruisers, and 51 torpedo boats and other small craft.

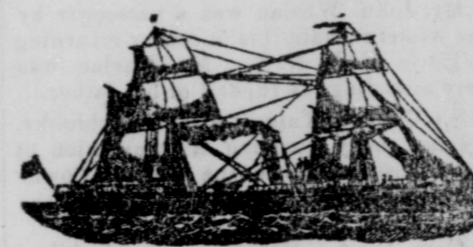

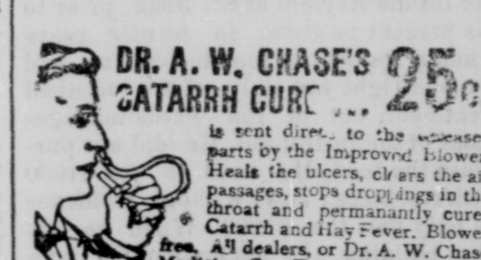
