**P. E. ISLAND'S EXHIBITION.**

If the present fine weather should continue, the P. E. Island Exhibition of this year will, without doubt, be the best that has been held here. Entries are being received from every section of the Province. We learn from Mr. Smallwood, the energetic secretary, that the various classes of exhibits will be filled to overflowing. Besides there will be many other attractions including the races, and the acrobats. After an interregnum of three years, the people are likely to show their appreciation of exhibition by coming to this one in force. Besides, if the fine weather should continue, numbers will come from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

**IMMIGRATION.**

SIR LOUIS DAVIES, at the rink, passed his highest eulogium upon Mr. Sifton, and gave him all the credit for all the immigration that he said was pouring into the Northwest. Now the British emigration returns up to the end of last month show very clearly what kind of immigrants we have been getting this season. The emigrants to British North America this year totalled 38,801, as against 25,309 last year, on the face of it a very satisfactory increase. But the satisfaction is greatly lessened when it is found that the increase is almost entirely foreign immigrants. The emigrants of British origin were less than a thousand in excess of last year; but the foreigners increased from 12,462 to 25,210. It is aptly remarked by the Montreal Gazette that we used to pride ourselves on the fact that if we got fewer immigrants than the States, they were of superior quality. But now it seems to be the other way. Two-thirds of our immigration is of foreign extraction. These are facts which give ground for serious consideration. Mr. Sifton's success in bringing in Gallicians and Doukhobors, and such like, is a very questionable benefit. At any rate, we do not think that Sir Louis Davies has strengthened himself in the good opinions of the thrifty and intelligent people of West Queens by his championship of the hero of the McKelzie-Mann deal and author of the "too liberal" immigration policy.

**COLD STORAGE.**

At the recent meeting in the rink, Hon. William Paterson, Minister of Customs, claimed that the Laurier-Tarte Administration had established cold storage; that to the Liberal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Sydney Fisher, was due the credit of initiating the movement. But this statement cannot be borne out by the facts. It was only a bit of bluff, like many other statements of the hon. gentleman.

It is a matter of history that a cold storage system for the safe carriage of butter was begun in 1895, under the Liberal-Conservative Minister of Agriculture. Arrangements were made whereby refrigerator cars for carrying butter were operated during the summer upon the main lines of railways running into Montreal.

In the same year arrangements were made for the fitting up of insulated chambers upon steamships from Montreal

to Avonmouth, Liverpool and Glasgow. Ten steamships were fitted up in that year.

In the season of 1896 arrangements were made for the fitting of three steamships with mechanical refrigerating plant and insulated chambers, having a capacity of 20,000 feet each; but the plan was not carried out because of failure on the part of the company contracting for the work to perform their contract.

This information is set forth in the Report of the Minister of Agriculture for 1896, which report is signed by Sydney A. Fisher.

Hon. Mr. Paterson could not have been ignorant of these facts when he claimed in the rink that the movement for cold storage was initiated by the Liberals.

By the way,—there's no cold storage for P. E. Island.

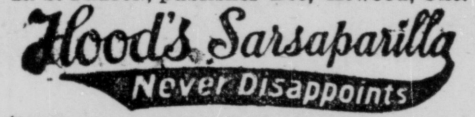

Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived from Ottawa in the morning, and proceeded to the Windsor hotel, where he was met by Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, Solicitor General Fitzpatrick, and ex-Premier Emmerson, of New Brunswick. During the day, Mr. Tarte went up to the Windsor hotel and was closeted for some time with the Premier. The story is that there is a big breach in the Cabinet, and that the Ontario Ministers are making a decided kick against Mr. Tarte's ascendancy.
