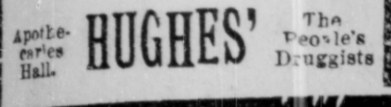

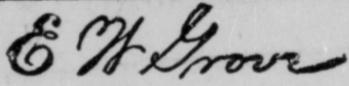

### ONTARIO IS ALL RIGHT.

#### An Official Statement From the Executive of the Liberal-Con- servative Association.

The Liberal-Conservative Association  
of Ontario has issued an official state-  
ment. The Liberal-Conservative party  
is, it says, solidly united under the  
leadership of Sir Charles Tupper, who  
presents the same policy in every part  
of the country. The Conservatives of  
Quebec may rely upon it that Ontario  
will give a larger Conservative major-  
ity at the approaching elections than in  
any previous period of its history. The  
electors of this province realize—as do  
the electors of the other provinces of  
the Dominion—that the measure of  
prosperity which generally obtains  
is due to the fact that we have  
been blessed for the past four  
years with abundant harvests, which  
have substantially improved the position  
of the farming community, and that  
the position of the manufacturing industries  
is a tribute to the statesman who, against  
the protest of the Liberal leaders, gave  
them that measure of protection which  
was necessary for their development, and  
which has not been seriously affected  
by the legislation of the past four  
years. The speeches made by the  
Liberal leaders last night were re-  
markable only for their omissions.  
Thousands of people, both Liberals and  
Conservatives, went to the meetings to  
hear what could be said by the apostles  
of Liberalism, as to the accusations  
which have been made, not only by  
the Conservatives, but by such leading  
Liberals as Mr. H. H. Cook, ex-  
M. P., but the audiences were sadly  
disappointed, and the general opinion  
in the city to-day is that the Con-  
servatives are more than justified in ac-  
cusing the Liberal party of having betray-  
ed the electorate and dishonored every  
pledge they gave in 1896. The province  
of Ontario will return at least fifty-five to  
sixty Conservative members to the  
legislature, and if it were not for the  
open and disgraceful alliance with the  
local Government, and the unblushing  
and indiscriminate use of corruption funds the  
Liberal party would be swept out of exis-  
tence in this province.

Episcopal Church, in Somerville, Mass.

"Those whom God hath joined," etc.,  
and the blessing of the Church, were  
pronounced by the brother-in-law of the  
bride, the Rev. T. F. West, B. A., a  
visiting Anglican priest from Canada.

After the service a goodly number of  
friends and relatives of the happy  
couple congratulated them at the resi-  
dence of Mr. F. Hodgkins. Among the  
numerous presents were some valuable  
articles of silver, a handsome specimen  
of Japanese manufacture, and a cheque  
for one hundred dollars from the busi-  
ness firm in Berlin, Germany, which  
Mr. Fletcher represents. Mrs. Fletcher  
is the youngest daughter of Robt. Lon-  
gard, Esq., of Belfast, and her future  
home will be in Allston, Mass, near  
Boston.

Kickham's garden was recently display-  
ed in the grocery store of McMillan  
Bros., (also Islanders) which attracted  
much attention. The display included a  
turnip weighing 19 pounds.

**ST DENSTAN'S CATHEDRAL.**—Before be-  
gining his sermons at High Mass yester-  
day, Rev. Dr. Morrison made a brief refer-  
ence to the approaching election, speak-  
ing especially of the sinfulness of  
trafficking in votes. He explained the  
nature of a vote, and emphasized the im-  
portance of each elector casting his ballot  
as his conscience dictated. He denounced  
the use of money or liquor to influence  
votes, and expressed the hope that no  
Catholic would be a party to the giving  
or taking of a bribe. Dr. Morrison ex-  
plained that he was not speaking on be-  
half of either political party, but was act-  
ing solely in the interests of the morals  
of the community and discharging a duty  
he owed to himself and the congregation.
