

Local and Other Items.

There will be a gathering of the Scottish Clans near Charlottetown on Thursday the 15th of August next.

THE QUEEN AND THE PRESIDENT.—Private advices to the St. John Telegraph state that repeated cable despatches were received at the State Department in Washington, from Her Majesty the Queen, inquiring as to the condition of the President and expressing the deepest sympathy with him and with the nation. Though the despatches were only what might have been expected, they made a deep impression. It is understood that the Governor General now in Halifax, has been making hourly inquiries as to the state of the President.

We beg to call the attention of the City authorities to the disgraceful state of the Brighton Road sidewalk. Several planks which were broken and gone, leaving holes from one to three feet deep in places, were repaired yesterday; but at other places the planks have sunk on one side, so that the walk rests at an angle of 45 degrees, making it impossible to walk upon. There are Tax-payers on this Road who receive no benefit from the gas or police, which absorb so much of the revenue. The least the city can therefore do, is to keep the sidewalk in decent repair.

FORMOSA MISSION.—The Rev. Dr. McKay, returned missionary from Formosa, will visit our city and hold a public meeting in one of the churches (probably St. James' Church) on Sabbath afternoon, about four o'clock. Dr. McKay will give some account of his labours and successes in a new field of missionary enterprise. He is, without question, one of the most remarkable missionaries of modern times. The interest he has awakened, wherever he has gone in Canada, has been very great, and the Christian people of the community have a rare opportunity of hearing from the lips of the living missionary, a story as remarkable as any which can be found in history of Christian missions. An opportunity will be given to those who may feel interested in the noble work, which he is prosecuting, to contribute to its support.—Com.

NATIVE PALESTINE ARABS.—The performance in Market Hall last evening was deeply interesting. The Arabs and their interpreter gave us a flood of light on life in the East—not now only, but as it was in the time of our Lord—and explained easily many dark and difficult passages of Scripture History. The company comprises six men, Professor Rosedale acting as interpreter. Clothed in their native costumes they presented in rapid succession their salutations, dinner etiquette, and a marriage ceremony, singing and dancing. The music was peculiar, and not at all unattractive, and the vocal songs drew forth thousands of applause. Not the least interesting portion of the entertainment was the exhibition of the curious rites of the Mohammedans, including the call to prayer, the howling and whirling dervishes; and there were other features which could not be appreciated from any description that could be given. They perform again this afternoon and evening.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A little boy, nephew of Alexander McKinnon, of Esdaile Foundry, met with a bad accident yesterday evening. He was playing with a number of other boys in a lot on Bayfield street. A horse was grazing near by and the little fellow, without contemplating the terrible results, ran and caught the animal by the tail. The horse on being thus annoyed, kicked viciously and struck the boy in the face, knocking him insensible. Messrs. McMahon and McQuaid, of the EXAMINER, on seeing the accident, went to the boy's assistance. He was lying on the ground, apparently dead, with four or five ghastly wounds on his face—two above the left eye, one on the right side of the chin, and one on the left cheek. The front teeth were knocked out and the face greatly disfigured. He was removed to his uncle's residence, Easton Street, where surgical aid was procured, and he is now doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.

THE NEWS FROM EUROPE. LONDON, July 4. The Chronicle's despatch from St. Petersburg announces that the Russian Consul at Sophia has telegraphed to M. Thiers that plot to assassinate Prince Alexander is discovered. Premier Ehrenroth has consequently gone to Stovtra. DUBLIN, July 4. A Land League meeting was held in New Ross on Sunday. Ten thousand people were present. Thomas Saxton, member of Parliament for Sligo County, was among the speakers. LONDON, July 4. The Times says that the Cornhill crew must now be satisfied that they have met better crews than themselves. ROME, July 4. It is reported that the resignation of General Caldini, as Minister to France, has been accepted. LONDON, July 4. Consul General Packard's Fourth of July dinner at Liverpool has been abandoned. The Standard's correspondent at Tunis says France has determined to mobilize 100,000 troops and send them to Africa to put down the insurrection with a high hand. MARRIED.
