Athabaskan To Be Home For Christmas

OTTAWA, (CP) — The destroyer Athabaskan, boasting the longest Korean service of any Canadian ship, will be home for Christmas.

The navy said Friday the Athabaskan will leave the Far East Nov. 18, one week earlier than originally scheduled, to ensure that her crew members can reach their home towns by Dec. 25. The ship now is scheduled to dock at Esquimalt, B. C., Dec. 11.

Now completing her third tour of duty in the Korean theatre, the Athabaskan has been away from her Canadian base for the last 14 months. All together, she served 30 of the 37 months of hostilities in Korean waters.

H.M.C.S. Crusader, which sailed from Esquimalt last Oct. 18, will take over the Athabaskan's duties.

Says Inflation Danger In The U. K. Crushed

LONDON, (Reuters) — Britain has crushed the danger of inflation even while spending additional millions for its huge social welfare program, Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler said Friday.

He told the House of Commons there has been a "remarkable improvement" this year in the internal economic position. The outlook for solving the dollar shortage, he said, is "not exactly set fair but it is settled from the point of view of balance of payments. We have reason to go forward with hope."

Butler spoke in the throne speech debate. In reply to Socialist statements that American aid has been doubled in the last 18 months to prop Britain's economy, Butler said dollar aid would be reduced by 50 per cent in the 1953-54 year to about \$200,000,000.

He expressed hope that British sales of military equipment under the United States "off-shore" procurement program would make up for the cut in direct dollar aid.

Legion Pres. Urges Poppies Be Worn

All members of the Canadian Legion are called upon to wear a poppy on Poppy Day, November 7, in a special message issued today by Charles Hogan, President of the No. 5 Branch of the Canadian Legion.

Urging that veterans of both World Wars and Korea set an example of reverence for the memorial day by wearing the memorial flower throughout the day, President Hogan said, "The Flanders Poppy is your Badge of Remembrance. Passage of the years has not dimmed our memory of those comrades of ours who served by our sides and who gave their lives for Canada. Let us then show that we remember them and honour their sacrifice by wearing proudly our memorial emblem on Poppy Day. In this observance, war veterans and Legion members should set an example for all citizens. Most people, he went on to say, wear on their lapel an emblem which proclaims their membership in one organization or another. Through it they make known to their fellow men their associations, their beliefs and their principles. Let us then for a few days proudly wear the Badge of Remembrance, thereby reserving our fellow Canadians of our reverence for the memory of those who died, of our belief in the principles for which they fought, and of our association in willing service with those whose sworn duty is the care of those who were left behind."

Members of the Canadian Legion should be among the first to put on their Badge of Remembrance on Poppy Day, and should co-operate in every way towards making the observance of that day a complete success.

Monthly Meeting Of Provincial Red Cross

The regular monthly meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Executive was held at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown on Thursday afternoon with the President, Lt. Col. Leo P. Macdonald in the chair.

Reports submitted by the Standing Committees showed that 410 Junior Red Cross branches have already re-enrolled for the present year, and that satisfactory progress is being made by the recently re-organized High School Council in Charlottetown. The Women's Work Committee is presently engaged in preparing materials for the 53-54 season.

The First Aid Committee report submitted by Dr. A. J. Murchison told of much interest being displayed in First Aid Classes and stated that 185 cases had received treatment this year at the First Aid Posts.

Miss Kathryn MacLennan said that there are now 19 classes in Home Care of the Sick under instruction in different parts of the Province and the demand for the loan of sickroom equipment continues to be very great.

Large Quantities Of U. S. Soft Coal Being Imported

"Never before in the history of the Province has there been such an influx of American soft coal as we are experiencing now," said a leading city dealer in discussing the unusual situation.

While it is true that several years ago an odd car of American soft coal reached the Island, more or less as a trial shipment, the carloads rolling in from West Virginia in competition with, or as a result of the difficulty in having orders for Cape Breton coal filled, has created an unusual situation.

"We placed a large order early in August for a high standard Maritime coal and not a carload has rolled to us yet, while we are daily confronted with the fact that coal from the same mine is being trucked to the Island every day," said another large dealer in the city. "We have no objection to purchases being made and carried direct in trucks but it is difficult to fill our orders without more consideration from the mine people."

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Mr. F. A. Large's Blood Donor Committee report showed the necessity for securing more donors than ever to meet not only the needs of patients in our local hospitals but the most recent request of the Department of National Health for blood for the manufacture of gamma globulin. It announced that clinics will be held during the week of November 29 at The Armouries in Charlottetown, at Morell, Souris, Mount Stewart, North Rustico, Long Creek and Summerside when at least 1050 donors will be required in the four day period.

Four items to be brought up at the forthcoming semi-annual meeting of the Central Council at Toronto were discussed in detail. The President told of the success of the "Know Your Red Cross" program staged during October at Eldon with an attendance of some 200 and said that he felt it was a very worthwhile effort and one that should be repeated in other centres. He announced that a new series of Red Cross broadcasts would begin on Saturday, Nov. 14.
