Kensington.-K.

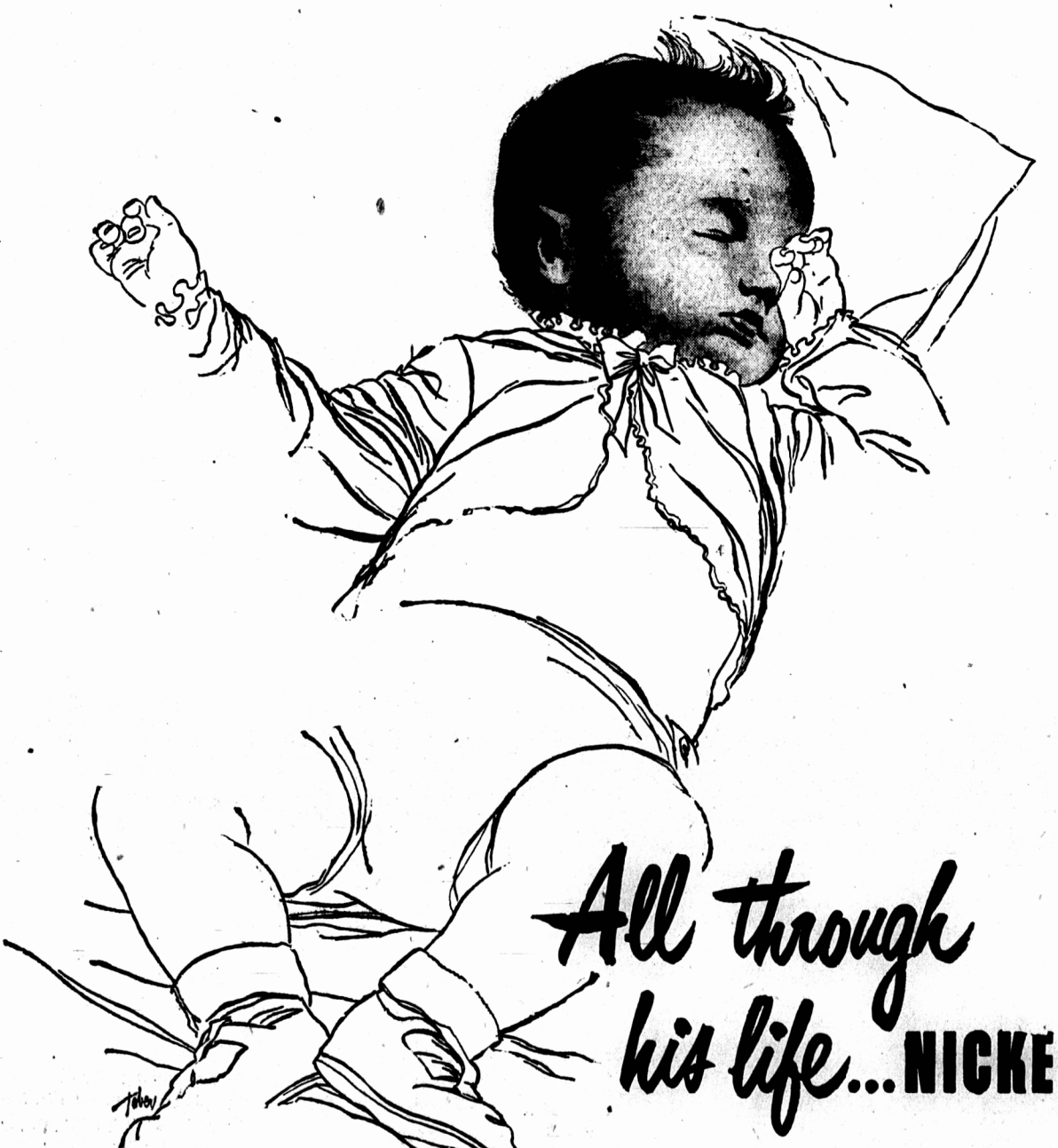
-WELCOMED TO COMMUN-
