Budget Debate Ended.

Cartwright's Resolution Lost.

THE GRITS CRESTFALLEN.

OTTAWA, July 29. The debate on the Budget was concluded this morning at four o'clock. Cartwright's amendment was defeated by 126. The Grits are terribly crestfallen. They prolonged the debate hour after hour, hoping to reduce the majority to below 20. When the figures were announced daylight was peeping in the windows, but the Opposition side of the House was black as thunder, Cartwright's face being an eloquent study. Immediately the House adjourned in the wildest enthusiasm in Government ranks, the Conservatives singing the National Anthem.

THE TARTE-McGREGGEEVY CASE

Unsatisfactory and Contradictory Evidence.

OTTAWA, July 29. In the Tarte-McGreevy investigation the examination of Robert McGreevy was continued. He failed to explain a number of suspicious entries in his books and was told to stand aside for the present. Leforce Langevin, assistant engineer of the Quebec harbor works, son of Sir Hector Langevin, was next examined. He denied having received money for his father from the Connolly's or any other contractors for elections or otherwise, and denied that he had ever told any person that he had. O. Thibault testified that Leforce Langevin had told him that he had received five thousand dollars from the Connolly's and sent it to Three Rivers for his father's election. McLean and Yeo leave for home to-day.

Civil Service Irregularities.

Arnoldi Again.

OTTAWA, July 29. In the Public Accounts' committee to-day, Mr. Arnoldi, mechanical engineer for the Public Works Department, admitted being the owner of the yacht "Joe," and having received money from the government for her services in the name of another party; also, receiving money for storage of government property. He also acknowledged receiving presents from contractors from whom he purchased supplies for the government. Arnoldi was very cheeky during his examination. Arnoldi, in the course of his examination yesterday, said similar irregular practices existed in McKenzie's administration, and gave several instances. Arnoldi has been suspended.

Complimentary Dinner.

OTTAWA, July 29. A complimentary dinner was given last night, in the House of Commons restaurant, to Col. Howard Vincent, by friends of the Imperial Trade movement. Ninety members and others were present.
