## Outmoded Court Ceremonies May Be Eliminated In Royalty

LONDON (CP)—A new conception of the British monarchy's role in the modern world may have evolved over the next few years.

It may result in further moves to eliminate outmoded court ceremonies, broaden contacts between throne and people, and improve the flow of news about the Royal Family.

The coming year may even see the Queen in a great address conference at Buckingham Palace. Prince Philip is said to be thinking of holding such a conference. SEEMS FLEXIBILITY

"It is broadly thought that the court is seeking to attain greater flexibility, without sacrificing valuable traditions or destroying the special aura of the monarchy," said a court official.

These trends are in line with developments in 1957. It was a year of triumph for the Queen. She prevented some exceptionally frank talk about monarchy's role in modern life. Views expressed by Lord Altrincham, editor of the National and English Review and later by Malcolm Muggeridge, former editor of Punch, aroused violent controversy.

Some interpreted the articles as direct attack on the Queen. Others construed them as a reasoned appraisal of the institution of monarchy in 20th century conditions, and felt that to view them as an affront to the sovereign was to read too much into context.

Altrincham, a 33-year-old Conservative, stressed that he regards the Queen, either as monarch or as a citizen, as a member of the Commonwealth, as an important and worthwhile institution. But he criticized "the Queen's style of conduct here, the way she was educated, her social life and public activities."

"REMEMBERED COMMENT" However, was Altrincham's comment that the Queen's style of speaking is "a pain in the neck." He also said the utterances which are put into the Queen's mouth convey the personality of a "priggish school teacher."

The highlight of the visit came Oct. 14 when the Queen opened the Queen's Canada Day celebration. The first time in Canadian history that a reigning monarch had read the speech from the throne.

"I greet you as your Queen," said the speech. "Together we constitute the parliament of Canada."

The emphasis on her capacity as Queen, rather than as monarch, was repeated throughout the three-day stay.

In a busy year, the sovereign also travelled to Denmark, Portugal and France. Prince Philip accompanied her, and early in the year, completed a four-month round-the-world tour.

"Queen's Canada Day" was a television broadcast about his trip and was the first time the Queen's personality of the year.
