Plans for the construction of the "haul-out" are now being prepared by Government marine officials and work on the project is expected to begin within the next few weeks.

The cost will be equally shared by the Federal and Provincial Governments.

He said although it is true Canadian newspaper costs more than that from Britain or Scandinavian sources, primarily because of the depreciation of sterling, "no one engaged in the production and distribution of newspapers will forget that it was the supplies from Canada which kept the British press alive throughout the war years."

Robertson, right-hand man to Canadian-born Lord Beaverbrook, added that from 1946 to 1952 the average price of British newsprint was 44 pounds 15 shillings 9 pence a ton compared with 37 pounds 8 shillings 6 pence for Canadian newsprint. In addition, the Canadian product was of heavier weight and better quality.

Robertson was commenting on a letter last Saturday from chairman G. B. Beckett of the Association of Makers of Newsprint, setting out prices for newsprint from British, Canadian and Scandinavian sources.

Robertson, born in Lanark, was educated at the University of Toronto. A chance meeting in 1914 with Lord Beaverbrook at the old Queen's Hotel in Toronto, where Robertson worked as a receptionist, is said to have led to his present job as Lord Beaverbrook's chief executive in one of Britain's mightiest newspaper empires.
