Turkish News Conferences Are Not Attended By Reporters

ISTANBUL (AP) — Turkey's strict press law, widely criticized abroad, so far has stuck both foe and friend of its sponsor — sensitive Premier Adnan Menderes.

Another neutral in the political fight that produced the law—a 15-year-old newsboy—also has fallen victim to it. He was convicted and fined for selling his papers by shouting a headline.

Other cases, mostly against anti-Menderes papers and their editors, are in various stages of trial.

of Turkish newspaper men, bitterness between the Menderes government and the country's free-wheeling press has suddenly noticeably in recent weeks. Menderes personally has taken the lead in an apparent effort to restore reasonably normal relations with the press.

For the first time since parliament adopted the press law last May, Menderes recently invited leading publishers to a lavish luncheon. He personally explained the government's ambitious plans to modernize Istanbul.

Most publishers afterwards expressed privately or in their papers the belief the meeting would start a new era of good feeling. Such meetings are called "press conferences" in Turkey although no working reporters are invited.

Until now there has been no action taken under a clause of the law that could send foreign correspondents to jail. The clause provides prison terms for those who "cause to be published abroad baseless or exaggerated news likely to undermine the prestige or position of the government."
