Lennox I. Store Damaged By Fire

SUMMERSIDE — A fire in the basement of the Lennox Island general store Sunday afternoon caused damage estimated at between \$1,500 and \$2,000. The fire was first noticed around 5 p.m. by sisters of the convent when smoke was seen emanating from a stock room immediately below the Indian agent's office.

The flames were extinguished by means of buckets of water and the fire was contained in the stock room, where a considerable quantity of flour was damaged. The Indian agent's office also suffered some damage. It's believed the fire originated from faulty wiring. The main portion of the store was undamaged.

P.E.I. Berries Not Dangerous Says Director

Prince Edward Island residents have nothing to fear from cranberries sold in this area it was revealed recently. Dr. Adelard Groulx, Montreal's health director has said that Montrealers and residents of eastern Canada "have nothing to worry about." He was referring to reports that some cranberries produced in Washington and Oregon states are suspected of being contaminated by a weed killer spray that may cause cancer. Dr. Groulx explained that he had checked with Paul Jean, regional director of the Federal Food and Drug Administration and had been assured that no cranberries from the far west states concerned reached the market in Montreal, Quebec or any part of Eastern Canada. "The cranberries consumed in this area come from Massachusetts and from Lemieux, Que., where this spray is not used," he explained. "The federal officials are watching the situation carefully and there is absolutely no cause for concern."

Plans For Historic Church Under Study By Government

Charlottetown's Mayor E. C. Johnstone has proposed that the Anglican Church at New Dominion on the south side of the West River be moved to Strathgarny Park. His idea is that a picture of R. L. Cotton and a plaque should commemorate the various contributions Mr. Cotton has made towards establishing parks in this province.

The mayor also points out that the church was designed by William Harris, brother of Robert Harris; and that it might be desirable to exhibit Harris religious paintings in that setting. He would also like to have an electric carillon to provide music during the summer months; and perhaps some historical objects. The provincial government is studying the project, although the Anglican Church has not yet offered the church building for the purpose. It is understood that if engineers report that it is practical to move the building the province would be willing to undertake the operation.

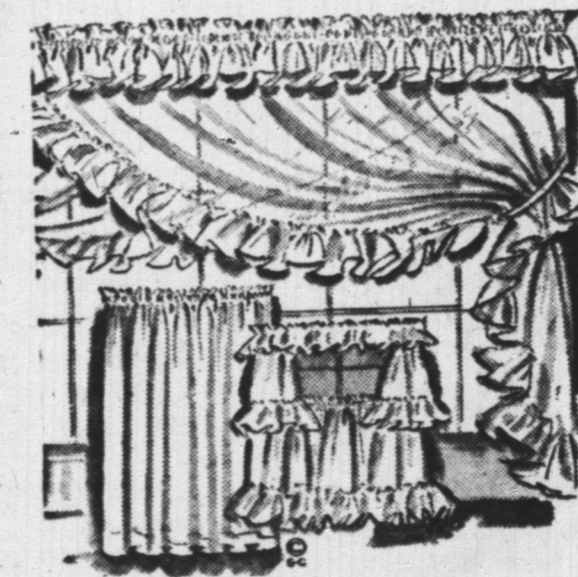

S' side Still In Running For Repair Contract

The possibility of the repair contract for the new Argus aircraft of the RCAF coming to Charlottetown appear slim, but the managing director of Maritime Central Airways, Carl Burke, is hopeful that his company may land the contract. He says his company is pressing for the contract with the work to be carried out at the Summerside where the aircraft will be stationed. He points out that facilities are available at Summerside which are not available at Charlottetown. It's believed that the repair contract for the huge aircraft of the RCAF's Maritime squadrons would provide steady employment for 200 throughout the year. The Argus aircraft will be stationed at Summerside when the present expansion program at the base is completed next year.

(Continued from page 1) better understanding and working conditions between both governments and I can again state the benefit of our conferences will be amply demonstrated as time goes on. The ministers of the various departments will no doubt reveal the results of these conferences particularly with reference to projects under public works, natural resources, agriculture, labor, welfare and health as plans under consideration are developed. "DUMBFOUNDED" Dealing particularly with the causeway, the Premier said: "During our absence we were rather dumfounded over the somewhat delirious and undisciplined outbursts that appeared in certain quarters regarding the causeway project, particularly in view of the fact that this matter has at that very time being considered by our group. "I have been singled out by the ex-premier and his local mouthpiece in a very personal manner and associated with these references are the terms "deception, vicious, fraud, duplicity" and other terms that fit so well into the utterances of these men. "I can only say if personal and completely untruthful utterances satisfy the natural inclinations of these men, I do not propose to lower myself to that level. The people of this province have already placed their stamp on tactics of this kind. "COMPLEX PROJECT "What is all the storm about anyway! Our party has been in power less than three months. Did these men expect that the causeway should now be under construction. Surely our people know that the causeway project is one of the greatest and most complicated of its kind ever undertaken in the history of mankind. "It is a project of extreme complexity. Some of the best engineering experts obtainable with staffs of competent constructional experts have been working on investigations, exploring, assessing, comparing findings and as these investigations continued, new problems have been encountered which demanded further exhaustive studies. "Is it reasonable, or would any sane person suggest that a project of this magnitude should be undertaken before every detail governing the practicability of such an undertaking is completely explored. "Yes in view of these circumstances it is so patently ridiculous that the leader of the opposition and a Patriot writer both of whom have but little knowledge of even the simplest form of construction should render the opinion without knowledge of the difficulties involved that the causeway is feasible and apparently should be constructed right away. "DID NOTHING "The leader of the opposition states he was one of the original sponsors of the causeway. What did he do about it during '60 long years he was in power? Simply nothing! A grant of \$6,000 was devoted to an investigation of this gigantic undertaking which scarcely covered the cost of digging a few holes for suitable rock. As far as adequate investigation was concerned, it never took place. "The present federal government has spent \$600,000 or more in these investigations and the study is still going on. A report has been given recently by the minister of public works and we shall continue to co-operate fully with federal authorities to promote these investigations to their final and complete conclusions.
