

Duke Leaves For North Aboard Cruiser Ontario

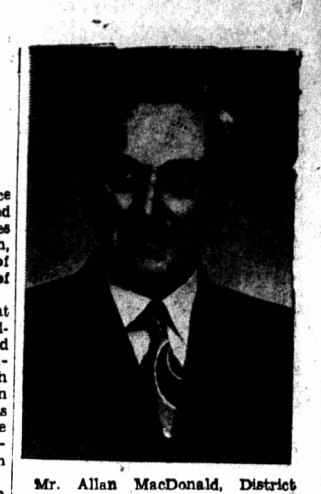

He was then sitting on the edge of the wharf with his back against one of the posts used by fishermen to tie up their boats.

The death of Mr. William D. McLeod of Tignish occurred in the Western Hospital Monday afternoon August 2. He was 82 years of age.
