## Seek Study Of Cattle Producing, Marketing

The Board of Directors of the A.C.I. Beef Producers Association yesterday decided to formally request the setting up, under ARDA of a comprehensive study of all aspects of cattle production and marketing.

A board spokesman said that the formal application will suggest "research into all related factors such as land suitability, climate, feed production, housing, management, marketing, quality and planning for the future."

He said "from the study it is expected will come much more definite information with respect to the stockyard proposals and associated marketing features."

The spokesman went on to say that the board "hoped that the study could be carried out on an early date."

He went on to say that "what the proposed study, if accepted is underway, the association in tends to strengthen itself, to gain the support of the cattle producers, and to continue its efforts on their behalf."

He said that "the Provincial Department of Agriculture will again be asked to give serious consideration to other aspects of a beef feedman for the province and to accept the responsibility of keeping on file a comparison of Toronto and Charlottetown prices."

He said that it was felt that such information would be of value in assessing the effect of future marketing programs.

During the meeting reference was made to the lack of cattle exports to the United States and the effect of the lower American cattle prices on the market in Canada. The meeting, however, was optimistic that cattle prices would not decline.

## Bishop Davis Presides Over Annual Meeting

The 120th annual meeting of Her Majesty the Queen, and the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Peter's Cathedral Hall on Thursday afternoon with the president the Right Rev. W.W. Davis, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia in the chair.

The meeting which was well attended was opened with prayer by Venerable Archbishop Davies.

In his opening remarks the Bishop spoke of the joy of all in welcoming Rev. Canon Malone to the annual meeting after a prolonged illness, and also the Revs. Plummer and Garwood who had taken duty on the Island since the last annual meeting. Also welcomed were some new lay delegates.

The Bishop also referred to the good work done by Canon Ferguson at Summerside and St. Eleonors and his early departure to be Hospital Chaplain in Halifax.

Reference was made to the Anglican World Congress held last year in Toronto; to the campaign and need of greater interest in the University of King's College, and stated that Rev. Rodney Ives would be admitted to the priesthood early in May and take charge of Georgetown Parish.

The Bishop also spoke of the coming visit to the Island of any Candidates Section of the

## Eight Cases Set Over In Magistrate's Court

The case of Everett James Ross, Fredericton, charged with selling liquor to another person was adjourned to April 29 for judgement by Magistrate James B. Johnson, QC, at Queen's County magistrate's court yesterday. The accused was represented by Bert Campbell.

Sylvia Ann Martin, a resident of New Brunswick, charged with uttering a forged document had her case adjourned to April 29 to fix a date for trial.

George Porter Farrows, Hanington, charged with illegal possession of liquor, not being the holder of a permit, had his case adjourned to April 29 for trial.

Two Charlottetown youths, John Wayne Casford, and Richard Daryl Casford, both of Douglas Street, charged with break, entry and theft at a Southport garage, were each given a two-year suspended sentence.

PAILED TO APPEAR  
A third city youth, who also pleaded guilty to the same charge will appear to be sentenced on May 1.

Soloman A.U. Tawil, North River, charged with possession of stolen goods, failed to appear but will appear April 29 for trial.

Percy MacInnis, city, charged with leaving a motor vehicle on the travelled portion of the highway, pleaded not guilty to the charge and the case was adjourned to April 29 for trial.

Ellsworth Mill, Clermont, charged with illegal possession of liquor, not purchased from a vendor, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

A Charlottetown man pleaded guilty to failing to appear for a motor vehicle re-inspection and was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

James Francis MacDonald, Point Prim, charged with illegal possession of liquor while his permit had expired, had the charge withdrawn by the crown. He was represented by Lester O'Donnell.

An accused was fined \$30 and costs or 30 days after pleading guilty to having illegal possession of liquor in a place other than his residence.

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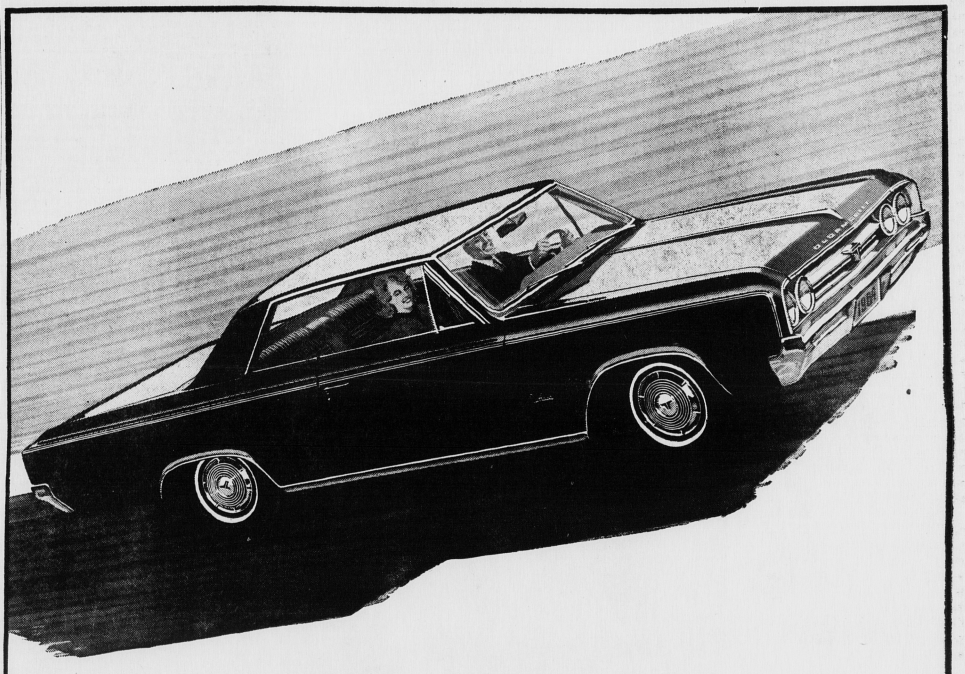
