

Pidsodny Shines As Moncton Takes First Game Of Finals; Edge Islanders 3-2 Here

Canada Roms To 12-0 Hockey Win Over Finns

DUESSELDORF, Germany (CP) Nine different players led by veteran Mike Shabaga scored goals Monday night as Canada romped over Finland 12-0 for a fourth straight victory in the world hockey tournament. It was just passing and shooting practice for the Canadians.

Shabaga, 32-year-old native of Rosthern, Sask., collected a goal in each period as he broke into the scoring column for the first time in the 10-day tournament which started last Friday. Three other players, George McAvoy, Don Berry and Bernie Bathgate, also got their first goals.

The Canadians carried the play almost 90 per cent of the time, and it was only the great performance of Finnish goalie Viitaa Unto which kept the score down. Unto made 53 saves including 22 in the second period. Canada's Ivan McLelland, who now has two shutouts in a row and the best goals-against average in the tournament, had such a breeze that he was called on to make a rare two saves in the middle session.

SHAKE GOALIE'S HAND
At the end of the game, the Canadians went en masse to shake hands with the Finnish goal-keeper.

Russia, also unbeaten in four starts and just behind Canada in goals averages, hardly had to work any harder to defeat Poland 8-2. Like the Canadians, the Russians had the reserves doing the bulk of the playing.

While the Canadians and Russians were bowling over their opposition, the third-place Americans had their hands full in getting past Switzerland 7-3. A brisk last period saved the game for the Americans. Germany, Sweden and Czechoslovakia were not scheduled.

Canada, Russia and the United States are idle tonight. Germany plays Finland, Switzerland meets Poland and Sweden is drawn against Czechoslovakia.

CHEER UNDERDOGS
The Canadians played in cold weather in Duesseeldorf's Eisstadion before about 2,000 fans, who cheered good plays impartially but rooted for the underdog Finns every time they touched the puck.

A special target was helmeted Bill Warwick, the leading scorer in the tournament, who picked up goal No. 9 and one penalty. He

The Moncton Hawks jumped into a 1-0 lead in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League best of seven finals as they edged the Charlottetown Islanders 3-2 in a fast and furious battle staged before an almost capacity house at the Forum last night. Nick Pidsodny starred for the Hawks while centerman Dewar Thompson scored the winning marker shortly after the finale started.

The Islanders out-played the Hawks by a wide margin in all three sessions but couldn't get the puck in the net as colorful Nick Pidsodny came up with save after save, stopping rubber with everything from his goalie pads to his jaw-bone on one occasion. Coach Steve Brklacich pulled Jim Shirley with a minute and fifteen seconds remaining in play but it just didn't work and the Hawks skated off with the win they wanted and now it remains for the Islanders to pull one off the Hub Stadium ice sheet before it is possible for them to win the series.

The Islanders out-shot the visitors 43-24, racking up a record as they really laid it on in the finale in an effort to get the tying and possibly winning markers, but they never did come and thus was the outcome of a well-played game as far as both teams were concerned.

The Islanders took very little time to get in stride in the opening period as the puck line swarmed Pidsodny with fine passing plays as soon as the opening whistle was sounded by Mel Snowden. They continued to give the Hawks lots of trouble for the first 14 minutes of play and then Hughie Campbell was sent to the cooler on a holding charge. The Hawks, led by Bert Hirschfeld, Tod Campeau and Ross Watson, organized and carried the play deep into the Islanders territory. Shirley came out of his net to cover the angle on a long shot. He successfully made the save but the rubber rolled behind him. Buck Whitlock, who was killing the penalty with Bob Gray, skated between the cage and Shirley in an effort to clear the rolling puck. As he touched the rubber his stick was promptly hit by that of Hirschfeld's and Hawks took a 1-0 lead at 15:22. The deficit didn't slow the Islanders down any and several seconds later, Pidsodny rose to dizzy heights as Brklacich blazed a low one for the far corner while Wimpy Jones, Orin Carver and Copper Leyte had the Hawks baffled with their passing play during the final minute of period play.

The Islanders started out killing penalty time again in the middle frame, but this time things went much better with Copper Leyte and Orin Carver not allowing a single shot on Shirley while Campbell was paying for his second infraction of the fray. Gray and Jones combined on a nice effort while Whitlock was serving a slashing sentence several minutes later. As soon as the penalties were served, the Islanders got back in a stride and swarmed all over the Hawks' cage with Joe Lepine in the cooler. At the mid-way mark play was just a bit ragged with both teams checking very closely and activity confined to the centre ice area.

Ray Leduc started the next organized attack, of either team, shortly after the 12-minute mark by carrying the puck into the Hawks' zone and sliding it netwards. A wild scramble occurred and when the smoke cleared Hirschfeld raced right back a minute later for the McNellie man and after crossing the island blue line slipped a short pass to Ross Watson at 10 feet in front and the stocky Monctonian right-winger placed a hard back-hand shot in the far corner to regain the Hawks' one-goal edge. Shirley came up with a sensational stop at the 14-minute mark off Ray Lacroix on a clear break.

The Islanders out-shot the visitors 19-4 in the finale but had to be contented in splitting a pair of goals with the Hawks. Ross Watson, who was on the ice when all three Moncton goals were scored, enters an insurance marker and make the final score read 2-0. Second game in this series will be played at Montague Saturday at 7 p.m.

Sports Forum

Sir,—Articles regarding local sport or sports were finding their way into the headlines of newspapers outside of the province in early June, 1934.

Eddie Tremblay of Los Angeles was the winner of a hard-fought, ten rounder with the "Boston Tar Baby", Sam Langford, at Venice, California. Tremblay was born in the community of St. Louis, P.E.I. He is now in or near his 59th year. Over a period of 17 years in the ring, he competed in 350 fights. In the period between 1919 and 1924, Eddie went to the ring wars 186 times, winning 162 of his bouts by knock-outs. He met and defeated such men as Jack Sullivan, George Chipp, Jeff Smith, Art McGrat and Bill McCormack.

In his day, Eddie fought in Montreal, Woodstock, Winnipeg and in England. In World War I he won the middleweight and light heavy-weight championships of the United States Navy. Those are the only titles he ever held, but he met them all and his record is one to be proud of.

During the colorful "White Hope" era, Prince Edward Island contributed Tom "One Man" McCuskey to the exciting scramble for some-one to wrest the world heavy-weight title from Jack Johnson. After defeating the best of the big fellows in Maine, Tom went on to New York where Tom O'Rourke did an excellent job of exploiting him. Unfortunately McCuskey's pugilistic qualifications didn't quite measure up to the high standards of Johnson's lusty ballyhoo program. But at that, Tom fought most of the good heavy-weights among them being Young Ramsay, Jim Ronco, Jim Mitchell, Johnny Stewart, Johnny Gibbons and Jim Smart.

Jim Pendergast of Kensington, P. E. I. made a name for himself while boxing in and around Boston at the turn of the century. He had as his trainer, the late George Hayes of this city. Byes at the time was also handling the affairs of other great fighters, such as Sam Langford and Bob Armstrong.

Pendergast met such good men in his day as Billy Payne, Jack Leon, Jack Sullivan and Jim Smart.

BROOKLYN, N.Y. (AP) —Big Bob Baker, the fast-punching Pittsburgh heavyweight contender, blasted Rex Layne's latest comeback campaign Monday night by hammering out a unanimous 10-round decision over the pudgy Lewiston, Utah, battler at Eastern Parkway Arena. Baker weighed 214½, Layne 205.

It was the eighth straight victory for the huge Pittsburgh Negro, rated as the fourth ranking contender. The defeat ended Layne's unbeaten streak at eight. He had won seven and tied once in shooting up to a No. 7 ranking.

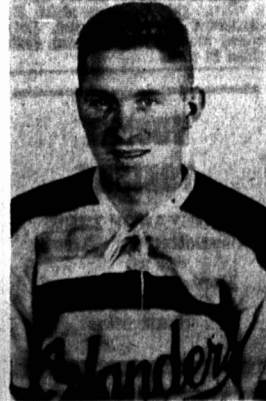
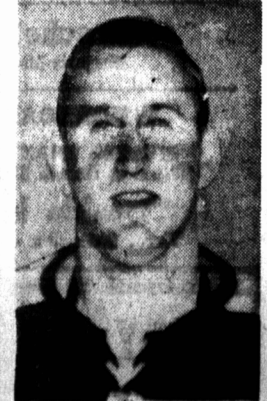

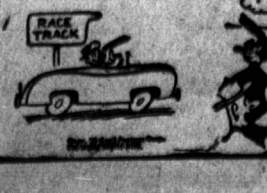


Stars Of Last Night's Game

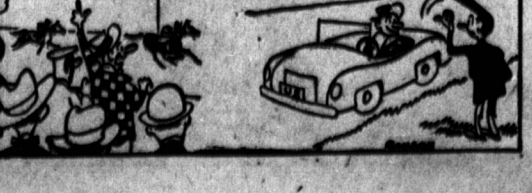
