DEATH BY THE CROSS.
ORIGINAL SENTENCE PASSED UPON
CHRIST STILL IN EXISTENCE.
How It Has Been Retained Throughout
the Ages—The Wording of the Sentence
Passed by Pontius Pilate Discovered
in 1880—Engraved on a Plate of Brass.
It will probably be a surprise to the
majority of people to learn that the original
death sentence passed upon Jesus
Christ is still in existence in the form of
an engraved plate from over every
day the sentence was pronounced by Pon-
tius Pilate, and which has been retained
throughout all these years as one of the most
precious of all relics of the Saviour.
The sentence is engraved on a plate of
brass in the Hebrew language, and on
its sides are the following words:—
"A similar plate has been sent to each
tribe."
This particular plate was discovered in
the year 1880 in the city of Aquila, in the
Kingdom of Naples, by a scientific com-
mission that had been appointed to search
that ancient city for the antiquities known
to have been kept there. Evidence re-
vealed that this city had been the repository
of many old Roman records and other
documents and monuments associated with
the early Roman Empire, and for some
time it was especially made the object of
the commission's inquiry.
The plate bore every evidence of
genuineness and accompanying it were
reliable documents, and among the
records were references that placed
beyond question the plate is now kept
in the chapel of Caserta, a little town
some twenty miles north of Naples, where
it is contained in a box of ebony, and
is carefully guarded by travellers, and
many voyagers en route for Naples diverge
from their beaten track to visit this little
shrine and look upon the everlasting me-
morial of the most remarkable judicial
sentence ever pronounced in the history of
the world. Translations in English, French
and German hang upon the wall near the
original, and it is thus readily understood,
while the study of the engraved lines,
and the appearance of the simple brass
appeal to the imagination of even the
most indifferent and brings before the
mind's eye the picture of that memor-
able scene, 1,800 years ago. Aside from
these records associated with the plate,
forth in every Christian mind at sight of
it is relic, there is also the historical in-
formation derived by looking upon an existing
object of the imagination of even the
most forth by an incident that will be the
most prominent in history so long as the
world exists.
The plate reads as follows:—
"Sentence pronounced by Pontius Pilate,
in default of the province of Lower
Judaea, in the name of the Emperor
Tiberias, and on the 26th day of the month
of March, in the only city of Jerusalem,
during the pontificate of Annas and
Caiphas.
"Pontius Pilate, intending of the
province of Lower Judaea, sitting in judg-
ment in the presidential hall of the presi-
dent, sentence Jesus of Nazareth to death
on a cross between two robbers, as num-
erous and notorious testimonials of the peo-
ple prove:
"1. Jesus is a misleader.
"2. He has excited the people to sedi-
tion.
"3. He is an enemy to the laws.
"4. He calls himself the King of God.
"5. He calls himself falsely the Son of
Israel.
"6. He went into the temple followed
by a multitude of people carrying palms
in their hands.
"7. On the first centurion, Quirinus
Cornelius, to bring him to the place of
execution.
"8. Forbids all persons rich or poor, to
prevent or retard the execution of this
sentence.
"9. This constitutes the body and, of course,
the interesting portion of the plate, but
in addition the names of three
men, and a preposition, and a participle,
value that their owners probably never
anticipated would cling to them, by the
being attached as witnesses of the promulga-
tion of this sentence.
The names of the witnesses and the order
in which they come are:
1. Daniel Kobani, Pharisee.
2. Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews.
3. Raphael Kobani.
It is believed that twelve of these plates
were engraved and sent to the various
provinces throughout Judaea and over the
Roman provinces of Europe. The remain-
ing eleven are probably buried in
widely separated points where they never
will be brought to the knowledge of man-
kind or have long since been destroyed.
The engraving on the plate is well done.
The Hebrew characters are cut deep and
with perfect accuracy.
It is astonishing how these whippersnappers
gather up everything. They know every-
thing and pretend to know more. They
are to all the houses in the neighborhood.
They have no taste for healthy news, but
for the scraps and peelings thrown out of
the kitchen of the back yard they have
great avidity. On the day when there is
a new scandal in the newspapers they have
no time to go abroad. On the day when
there are four or five columns of delightful
private letters published in a divorce case
they stay at home and read and read and
read night, perhaps they may find time
to run out a little while and see whether
there are any new developments. Satan
does not have to keep a very sharp lookout
for his evil dominion in that neighborhood.
He has let out the whole contract. These
women get husbands and wives into quar-
rels, and brood and slanders into argu-
ment, and disgust the pastor with the
dock and the flock with the pastor, and
they make neighbors, who before were
kindly disposed toward each other, over-
suspicious and critical.
