

Membership Drive Is Underway Here

This is membership drive week for the P.E.I. Community Concert Association and the association, which already has over 600 members, is hoping to add 150 new ones this week.

The last concert sponsored by the organization this season will be on Thursday at the Confederation Centre Theatre when the Feis Eireann, singers and dancers from Ireland who are nearing the end of a 16-week North American tour, will entertain.

Beginning their tour in early January, the group paid visits to Iceland, 30 American states from California to Maine, and after leaving here will make their last stop in Newfoundland before returning to Ireland. The company of 23 young Irishmen and women sing, play and dance Irish melodies ranging from songs of bubbling joy to tragic laments, from the Londonderry Air to the Irish Hornpipe.

The Association booked three concerts this season and intends to have at least three and possibly four next year. The three tentative bookings for next year — and contracts to make the bookings definite have to be signed by this Saturday, April 23, which is the reason for the early membership campaign — are the Les Evans Trio, pianist David Bar-Illan and the Robert DeCormier Folk Singers. If enough new members are signed for the new season a fourth concert will be booked.

The Les Evans Trio is a brilliant jazz group of piano, drums and bass which has been praised as "absolutely the best of the new, listenable jazz geniuses around today." Bar-Illan received a tremendous ovation when he performed here two years ago. The DeCormier group of 14 singers and three instrumentalists feature a new interpretation of the folk song in a classical setting.

New members may attend the Feis Eireann performance if they join the Association by Thursday.

Charlottetown, Royalty Will Elect Four Members

For the first time in history, Charlottetown and Royalty now will elect four members in the upcoming provincial election which Premier Walter R. Shaw called over the weekend. The city could pay a major role in its outcome as provisions of the Election Act 1963 go into effect. The act as proclaimed this year with one amendment.

The original act wiped out the Fifth district of Kings, normally known as the Georgetown district. The amendment restored the district.

Some observers see this development as favoring the Progressive Conservatives as the Charlottetown area has traditionally leaned that way. It would mean the likelihood of four members on the government side, instead of the two it formerly elected. The new election act gives the city four members.

Compensating for that, to some extent at least, is the fact that the new act allows any voter to cast a ballot in only one electoral district—the one in which the voter resides. The property vote—it is now abolished—allowed voters to cast a ballot in any district where they owned property.

As a result, many Charlottetown voters in the Southport poll, for example—summer cottagers in the Keppoch, Langley and Rosebank areas—and others own cottages in Stanhope, Tracadie, Dalway and in other summer resort areas.

There was a feeling that the predominantly Tory Charlotte-

town voters had a strong influence in some of these districts.

City people will no longer be able to vote in any of these areas now, so this is one of the marked changes under the new act.

With just over 40 days left until polling day, there will be a rush by the contesting parties to get candidates in the field.

The Liberals have only two men named Eugene Cullen, City and Cecil Miller, Frenchfort, were named some time ago to contest 3rd Queens. The Conservatives have named candidates in First Prince.

There was no indication early yesterday what action the NDPs will take in the election campaign.

Commenting yesterday morning on the fact that in his election announcement he had made industrial development the major issue in the provincial election battles to begin shortly, Premier Walter R. Shaw said, "there was no other way to do it. There was no criticism of health, welfare or roads. All these records were left and the criticism centered on industrial development."

The Premier stated he thought the industrial development program was, "to my mind exceedingly well performed and shouldn't take very much defence."

In the last session of the Legislative Assembly the Premier said the Opposition made a number of "unfair insinuations, not based on the success of the industrial development program, but on the administration of it."

Mr. Shaw said, "industrial development is not the only area where we will defend the government. I've got a lot of material and the record of the government is obvious."

The Premier is prepared for a heated campaign during the next six weeks and he is "going to hold a campaign on a very high level."

The Premier termed the Liberals' criticism of the department of agriculture's appropriation as, "most ridiculous, in addition."

Mr. Campbell said that agriculture was receiving "less than four per cent of the provincial budget."

Labor Meeting Held Recently

At a meeting here yesterday morning, Reginald Charlebois, representative of the Laborers' International Union of North America, told construction strikers "We've got to stay the way we are and wait."

The men are striking for wage increases to coincide with the rising costs of living.

Mr. Charlebois assured the men that there will be battle before this fight is won. He said that although the contractors cannot see it now, this strike is to help them too. "It will promote better relations between the employer and his employees," he said.

One of the men in the crowd said that the employers have found themselves in an embarrassing position. "They never before had to come to the workers' aid," he said. "They are trying to save face."

Over the week-end Mr. Charlebois held two meetings in Summerside. He said a good number attended but more were unable to attend as they lived out of town and were not available for the week-end meetings. He said he would hold another meeting last night.

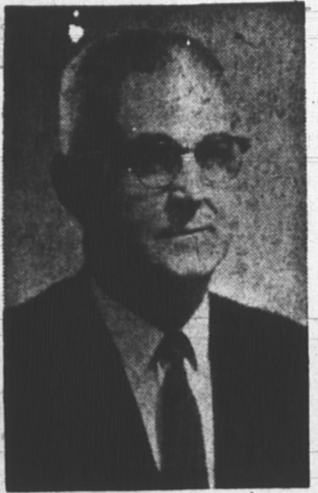

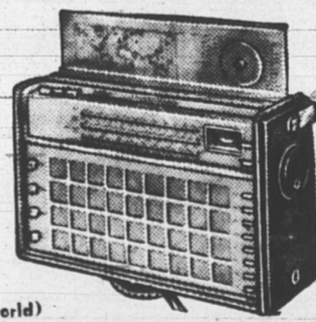

GNP IN U.S. RISES
WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. gross national product (the value of all goods and services produced in the economy) rose sharply during the first quarter of this year to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$714,000,000, the commerce department reported Monday. The rise of \$17,000,000,000 represented a 2.5 per cent gain over the fourth quarter of 1965, but the figures are preliminary and subject to revision.

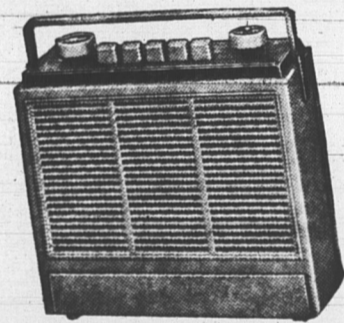

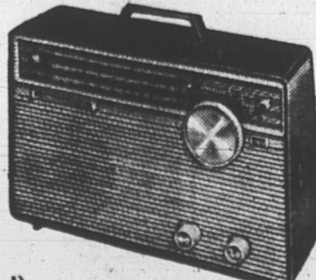

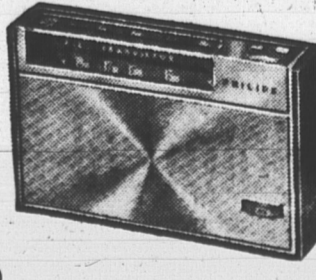
