### ORDER RESTORED IN CRETE

Senate Read. Roomed People Have Been Killed in the Riots.

CANDIA, Crete, Sept. 9.—The detachment of the International troops which has arrived here occupied the fortifications and restored order.

It is now estimated that 200 persons were killed during the rioting.

### AFTER THE KHALIFA.

He Has Not Yet Been Captured.

OMDURMAN, Sept. 9.—One of the gunboats, sent in pursuit of the fugitive Khalifa has returned here.

Her commander reports that he went sixty miles up the river and saw about one thousand fleeing horsemen.

### Against the Liquor Traffic.

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—The Government has received a memorial from the National Temperance Federation of Great Britain, asking that stringent measures be adopted to control the liquor traffic in the Yukon and the Western Canadian gold fields.

### A Martyr to his Work.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—A special despatch from Omdurman says: Hubert Howard, the correspondent of the Times, met his death owing to his eagerness to get the first news of the fate of Karineufeld and the other European prisoners of the Khalifa. He pressed into the city before it was safe to do so and was making his way all alone down a narrow alley leading to the prison, when he was attacked and killed.

### Kitchener Congratulated.

London, September 8.—The Lord Mayor, in the name of the citizens of the London, has congratulated Sir Herbert Kitchener upon his great victory over the Dervishes and informed him that the freedom of the city awaits him upon his return here.

## DISORDERLY SCENES IN THE CORTES

Members Threaten and Insult Each Other.

SEVERAL DUELS WILL BE FOUGHT AS A RESULT.

Spain is Desirous to Hold on to the Philippines.

MADRID, Sept. 9.—The disorderly scenes which were witnessed in the chambers yesterday would have shamed a bull ring. Fists and sticks were shaken in the air and invectives were heard on all sides.

As a result several duels are expected to place.

It is understood here that Spain intended to bargain at Paris peace conference to retain part of Philippine Islands, but the impression prevails that a republica will be established under the protectorate of the United States, Great Britain and Germany.

### An Indian's Appeal.

TORONTO, Ont., September 7.—A real Indian chief addressed the Methodist General Conference yesterday afternoon in the person of Chief Benson, from one of the North West Missions. Rev. Dr. Sutherland spoke of him, and Chief Benson, who is a very old man, then took the platform.

"I speak English very little. I am Indian, regular Indian. I am glad to see Methodism prosper. I remember when there were few Methodists here, 20 or 30. These are now gone—in Heaven. My people hear the good word of Mr Lawrence every Sunday. I can sing a little.

"Sing, sing," asked several.  
The Chief then started a hymn, winding up with an appeal for his barren, barren home. A collection was at once taken up and President Carman placed an envelope, containing the proceeds into the Chief's hands. "This is universal language," said he.

"I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I shake hands with you all," said the Chief.

### Dreyfus and the Emperor.

BERLIN, Sept. 8.—The Cologne Gazette says: "If the French military newspapers incite the belief that France, through the publication of the whole Dreyfus documents, will risk war with Germany, the latter is entirely unconcerned. We are aware of what documents are meant, namely, certain alleged letters that Emperor William is supposed to have written to Dreyfus. Germany awaits the publication of these forgeries with the utmost indifference. The Emperor does not correspond with spies. However, in the event of an agent or superior officer having forged the Emperor's name, this would not be a reason for Germany making war on the republic."

## A SENSATIONAL DEVELOPEMENT

In the Famous Dreyfus Scandal.

THE GERMAN AMBASSADOR TO FRANCE GIVES NOTICE

That he will Demand his Passports if Certain Letters are Used.

ROME Sept. 9.—The Tribunal declares that Count Von Munster, the German Ambassador to France, in the name of the Emperor William, has just reported to M. Del Casse, the French Foreign Minister, that alleged letters between the Emperor and Count Von Munster, and the Emperor and Captain Dreyfus are spurious, and that if the French Government should utilize such false documents in an eventual trial, he, Von Munster, had orders to demand his passports.

### GALLANTRY OF THE LANCERS.

Bravery Praised by the Press.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—The papers here enlarge proudly on the charge of the twenty-first Lancers at Omdurman, which they describe as a second Balaklava. Making all allowances it seems to have been a brilliant defeat. It was the maiden engagement of the regiment, which was recently converted from Hussars.

They were ordered to prevent the broken enemy from returning to Omdurman, five miles distant. They charged to within thirty yards of the Dervishes, when suddenly they found themselves confronted by 2,000 hidden reserves. They did not hesitate, though they were exposed to a withering infantry fire, but began to back their way through the enemy, who stood twenty deep. They struggled through, but every one who fell was instantly hewn to pieces by the fanatical Dervishes.

The brunt of the fighting fell on No. 2 Company. A corporal of this company, who arrived on the far side of the enemy drenched with blood and reeling from weakness, was ordered to fall out. Waving his bent lance, he shouted "Never," and called to his squadron: "Form up No. 2."

After cutting lanes through the enemy the Lancers, bleeding and blown, reformed steadily. Col. Martin refused to allow them to charge again. He ordered them to dismount and to pour a carbine fire into the Dervishes. This fire drove the enemy back into the line of the Anglo-Egyptian fire.

Another incident of the charge was the gallant attempt of Lieut. Montgomery, Captain Kenna and Corporal Swerback to recover the body of Lieut. Grenfell. They kept the enemy off with their revolvers and placed the body on a horse, which, however, shied, rendering their attempt fruitless.

Despatches from Berlin, Vienna, Paris and Rome say that the mayors of those cities join in an unwonted chorus of ungrudging praise of the British troops.

The Temps, of Paris, for instance, says that the British army has given proof of that valor, at once disciplined and impetuous, which is the grand military virtue of the race.

### Revenue From the Yukon.

OTTAWA, September 8.—The revenue collected by the Canadian Government in the Yukon, for seven months ending July, is thus stated: Sale of lots in Dawson, \$28,450; liquor permits, \$9829; certificates and licenses issued by gold commissioners, \$90,664; fines, \$1695; lease water front for 3 months, \$7500; crown timber accounts \$923; customs, \$38,000; royalty on gold produced, \$351,793; total, \$525,145. In addition \$24,000 was collected on behalf of the North-West Territorial Government for saloon licenses.

### Annexation of the Philippines.

LONDON, Sept.—The Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: Americans living in the far east are unanimously in favor of the annexation of Luzon, which, so far as finance and trade are concerned, forms the main portion of the Philippines. Spain might retain the rest of the archipelago, of which at present are of value, as, for instance, Paday and Cebu. They (the Americans) are convinced that Germany has arranged with Spain for the purchase of Palawan and Sulu Islands.

The exodus of Spanish families, priests and friars from Manila continues. They all appear convinced that Spain's rule in Luzon is at an end. The monastic orders, anxious on account of their large properties in the interior, are endeavoring to dispose of them. They would welcome American or English authority.

Considerable anxiety exists regarding the ten thousand to twelve thousand prisoners, including Spanish troops and civilians, women and children, in the hands of the Filipinos. Some of them are undergoing humiliations and hardship, and circumstances may arise which would endanger their lives. Efforts should be made by Spain and the United States jointly to secure their ransom.

While in Manila I found a rigid censorship touching friction with the native leaders. So far I do not believe it serious, but tactful treatment is certainly necessary in order to prevent possibility of rupture.

### Smuggled Tobacco.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—All over Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, inland revenue officers are searching stores of tobacconists and grocers and bar rooms of hotels for contraband cigars, which make up one of the biggest seizures of smuggled tobacco ever brought into Canada. The goods were made in Porto Rico, and were landed somewhere around Halifax, but just where the revenue officials have not been able to learn.
