Business Reality Seen Behind Them Fair

Many words have been written in the last week about Ngo Dinh Diem. Still the question lingers: What sort of man was he? Here is an insight by a correspondent who has seen Diem's rise to power in South Viet Nam in 1954 and met him on many occasions.

TOKYO (AP)—"But yesterday the word of Caesar might have stood against the world; now lies he there, and none so poor as he himself."
These words of Shakespeare's Marc Antony could be written about a man named Ngo Dinh Diem, creator and once president of the Republic of South Viet Nam, whose crumpled body lay in a secret place in Saigon, snatched by millions he once led.

Blindness to reality, suspicion, arrogance and an inability to brook opposition brought him down. Yet, as of great interest to the world, he did love him once, not without cause.
Even his enemies will admit, in a calmer moment, that had it not been for the subterranean and courageous of his distinctly shy aristocrat, South Viet Nam today might well under the iron rule of Communism.
In the summer of 1954, the whole of Viet Nam was in a state of chaos. The French had lost the battle of Dien Bien Phu, the great military fortress at Geneva were carving the country into a Communist North and a free South. It seemed only a matter of weeks before the hippy-headed Red chieftain Ho Chi Minh would install his capital at Hanoi, would gather the tattered pieces left in the South into a united Communist republic.

Student Editorial Regarded Semi-Seriously by Legion

TORONTO (CP)—A front-page editorial in the University of Toronto's student newspaper calling Remembrance Day a "grotesque custom" was regarded semi-seriously by Legion members and others.
The editorial, written by Ken Drushka, editor of The Varsity, said in part "we feel nothing but disgust for the institutions and leaders which created a need for this annual ceremony."
Drushka also wrote that "the majority of men who went to war did not understand the essential meaning of what they were doing, any more than most men do today."
