

Halifax Atlantics In 5-3 Win Over Islanders In League Opener Here

Dugger MacNeill, making his first start as a playing coach and returning to Charlottetown after an absence of half a dozen years, guided his Halifax Atlantics to a 5-3 win over the Charlottetown Islanders in one of the opening games of the Maritime Major Hockey League at the Forum last night.

The Atlantics, playing with only 12 men came from behind in the third period to gain their victory. They trailed 2-1 going into the last frame, but raced into a 3-2 lead at the half-way mark and thereafter were never headed.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse opened the season by facing-off the puck between Hub Beaudry and Billy Watson. Prior to the opening of the game the fans and players maintained one minute's silence in respect to the late Johnny Dutchak, Islanders defense star of the past two years.

The game was played under protest by the Islanders. Halifax netminder Roy MacMeekin, who attended New Westminster training camp was suspended by that club several weeks ago and then signed with Halifax.

The Islanders protested his use before game time but Halifax claimed that the suspension had been lifted during the afternoon. Immediately after the game the Islanders forwarded a protest to the C.A.H.A. and expect a ruling today.

MacMeekin played a big part in the Halifax victory. The stocky, black-hatted goalie held the fort for the Atlantics in the first two periods as the Islanders controlled the play. He was called upon to make 24 saves against 17 for Don Campbell in the Islanders net.

In the third period the tide changed as the Halifax forwards took advantage of every break which came their way. At one point they led 4-2 but with less than three minutes to go the Islanders cut the margin to one goal. The Atlantics fired the insurance goal into an empty net.

The game, which was played before approximately 2100 fans started at a fast clip. The pace slowed somewhat in the middle frame and also in the third. It was rough in spots but mild in comparison with the Halifax-Islanders opener of last year ago.

The first shot on net was fired by George McLagan of the Islanders who drilled a hard drive at MacMeekin from the blue line at the 50 second mark. The Islanders started with the Beaudry, Gordon, Hagan line and Halifax countered with Watson, MacPhee and Ford.

McLagan had the first good scoring opportunity when Bob Gray sent him into the clear as Dugger MacNeill sat out a minor penalty for holding.

Garey Gordon, Islanders new right winger opened the scoring at the 8:12 mark. Gordon stepped out of the penalty box as the puck skidded across the Halifax blue-line into the Atlantics end. He raced into the corner with a defender, grabbed the puck and centered it out to Jim MacKenzie.

MacKenzie fired a shot that was blocked by a Halifax defenseman. Gordon picked up the rebound and backhanded it past MacMeekin from 15 feet out.

Foot-footed Billy Ford sliced through the Islanders' defense and broke into the clear to score the equalizer at the 4:40 mark of the middle frame. Ford took a pass from Watson following a face-off just outside the Islanders' blue line.

Less than six minutes later Buck Whitlock put the Islanders ahead again. The Islanders were playing with a man advantage when Whitlock tipped Bob Gray's hard drive from inside the blue line. Garey Gordon drew an assist on the play.

The second period saw the only major penalty in the game when Crusher Kelly and Frank King tangled in the Halifax end. The Islanders enjoyed a wide edge in play during the 20 minutes.

Bob Bowness, who played a standout game for Halifax, evened the score early in the final frame after taking centerman Frank King's pass-out.

Then Billy Ford, a thorn in the side of the Islanders for the past three seasons, put Halifax ahead by scoring on a screened shot from 25 feet out at the 10:07 mark.

Big Frank King continued the Halifax onslaught as he scored on a solo rush out of his own end. The flashy Halifax centre broke out over his own blue line with only one man back. The lone defender backed in on top of the goalie and King fired a blazing

shot from 20 feet that caught the upper right hand corner.

The Islanders then came to life and applied the pressure. Their efforts were finally rewarded when Jim MacKenzie tipped in Connie Bonhomme's slap shot. Bonhomme was set up by Buck Whitlock.

With only 30 seconds left in the game Chamberlain pulled goalie Campbell in favor of the extra forward. The move backfired as Billy Watson cleared the puck out of his own end. Frank King followed and fired the disc into the open goal.

Bob Gray and Garey Gordon were the best of the Islanders. Lou Kiley turned in a good, steady game on defense while Campbell turned in a good game.

For Halifax little Billy Watson played his usual standout game. Bill Ford, Bob Bowness and Frank King were also outstanding while Lepine and Bloom played well on the blue line.

Worth \$3,148 Year Extra To Be With Yankees

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 — (AP) — Great to be a Yankee? Sure, say the Yankees. The club's press department got busy with the adding machines and figured out today that it's worth \$3,148 a year extra to be a member of the world champion Bronx Bombers.

That's the average world series since the Yankees have divided up since 1919. They've had 19 pennants, 11 in that time and 15 world championships. That part of the players' pool for the Yankees amounted to \$3,265,698. Add the total for six second place teams, five third placers and one fourth place club and you get a grand total of \$3,528,809.

Only once in the last 32 seasons have the New Yorkers finished out of the money. That was in 1925. On a basis of 35-man split each year, the Yankees figured out that the average player share through those years amounted to the \$3,148. That's better than twice as much as the next best club, St. Louis Cardinals, have averaged through that span. The Cards made the World Series nine times and got in the money 26 times for an average extra income of \$1,465.

Rejects \$100,000 For English Colt

LAUREL, Md., Oct. 20 — (AP) — Laurel officials said today Wilwyn's owner had rejected a \$100,000 offer for the English colt, which won the Washington International turf race here Saturday.

A spokesman said the track had relayed the offer to owner Robert Boucher, who returned to England yesterday.

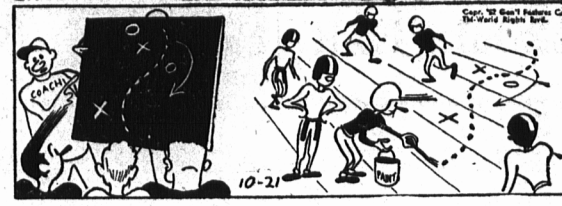
Laurel said the offer came from Jack Hernandez, California race track public address announcer, acting as an agent for an "immediate buyer."

IN THIS CORNER

Halifax Atlantics last night won the rubber match in their opening game series with the Charlottetown Islanders. Ever since the Islanders re-entered Maritime Major League hockey they have been meeting Halifax in the first game of the season. The first year the Islanders opened the season with a 6-3 win over the Saints. Last year the Haligonians evened the count with a 1-1 victory over the Islanders in a bitu-

ally played game at the Forum. With their 5-3 win last night the Haligonians went one game up and for the first time in the three years they looked as though they deserved to win.

The Atlantics, with youthfull Dugger MacNeill as their coach, made a surprise comeback in the final period. They led only 12 men and they lagged badly in the second period but they came to life in the third with a four goal outburst. Under the conditions it might not have been too much a surprise if they had been the ones to let up in the final period. They skated with the Islanders and in the final analysis they were able to capitalize on their breaks while the Islanders weren't.

Following the game Dugger MacNeill dressed quickly in the Halifax dressing room. He was in good spirits and had reason to be. On Sunday night he had talked with big Hughie Campbell in Halifax and had done everything but sign the right winger. By today Campbell may be signed and ready to play against the Glace Bay Miners.

When signing a defenseman from Quebec Aces by the name of Hayes and he will be here tomorrow," stated Dugger. "We expect two more wing men around the end of the week and then we should be set," concluded the Halifax mentor.

With this strengthening the Atlantics will be a formidable club. They have two top lines now and the addition of three extra forwards will give them a lot of attacking power. Billy Watson and Bill Ford have always been a dangerous combination. Frank King and Bob Bowness appear just as dangerous.

MacNeill explained following the game that Halifax officials and Kenny MacKenzie, owner of New Westminster reached an agreement on MacMeekin some time after the suspension was imposed and that the Royals wired that they were lifting the suspension yesterday.

Lorne Hennessey and Orin Carver, who were expected to play with Halifax last night, have not been signed by MacNeill. Dugger claimed that both boys were playing very good hockey and were probably good enough to make the team but that they would probably develop better in another league. Carver, he stated, would be going back to Barrie Flyers while Hennessey would likely play Allan Cup hockey.

Getting back to the game it could be stated that it was a good one for an opener, especially in the first period. Bob Gray and Garey Gordon played heads up hockey for the Islanders. Bob was skating as fast or faster than at any time last season and he was definitely the pick of the forwards. The big fellow took his

15 Horses Entered For Empire Gold Cup

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 — (AP) — Fifteen horses, including the English-bred Zuchero, were listed today for the \$75,000 added Empire Gold Cup at Jamaica Saturday.

Two other foreigners, French-bred Worden II and Calvert, had been nominated for the rich mile and five furlong event but owner Ralph Strassburger declared them out today. Strassburger, a Morristown, Pa., publisher, has been living in France for years.

A fourth outsider John S. Kroese's Argentine star, Agall II, also was named for the race but it is doubtful whether he will get there in time.

Zuchero finished a good third in the Washington International Laurel Saturday behind another English horse, Wilwyn, and Ruhe. Greek Ship, a disappointing sixth in the International, also was named for the Gold Cup along with Cray Admiral, the handicapper ace; One Count, the three-year-old star; Blue Volt, One Hitter, Alerted, Kiss Me Kate, Top Market, Risque Rouge, Hull Down, Lafourche, Combat Boots and Lone Eagle.

With only 19 pounds to carry, the three-year-old One Count looms as the best of the United States entries. Mrs. Walter Jeffers' colt has won the Belmont Stakes, Travers and Jockey Gold Cup. Older horses, including the four-year old Zuchero, will have to tote 126 pounds.

Will Discuss Canada's Plans For Figure Skating

OTTAWA, Oct. 20 — (CP) — Canada's representation this winter at the world figure skating championships will be discussed Saturday at a meeting at the Toronto Skating Club.

Since 1947, when Barbara Ann Scott won the world's singles crown at Stockholm, the Canadian Figure Skating Association has sent teams to Europe.

There is some doubt as to whether Canada can field a team this year to make participation worthwhile.

The C. F. S. A. executive might possibly decide it could devote the effort and money more profitably this year in other ways.

On the other hand, it is reported that some executives believe that if Canada is to develop world class skaters it must send young skaters to the championships for competitive experience, even when they are not expected to win.

Donald B. Cruikshank of Ottawa, president of the C. F. S. A., said that in general the policy is to send a team if it is felt the Canadian skaters can make a reasonably fair showing.

The annual meeting will decide this Saturday along with such questions as the time and place for the Canadian championships and Canadian participation in the North American championships. The world meet will be held in Paris in mid-February.

The Association last year sent six skaters to the world championships and the Olympics. The Toronto team of Frances Dufoe and Norris Bowden placed fourth in the world pairs championships and sixth in the Olympics. Peter Firstbrook, also of Toronto, ran sixth in the men's singles.

Other members of the team, who failed to place in either event, were Suzanne Morrow and Vevi Smith of Toronto and Marlene Smith of Niagara Falls, Ont.

The Canadian championships this year will be held in the east, and several clubs, including Ottawa's Minto Skating Club which fostered Barbara Ann, are understood to be making bids for the position of host.

U. S. Skating Championships On March 25-28

Joseph K. Savage of New York said the North American championships had been awarded to Cleveland with March 6 and 7 as the probable dates. The dates do not become definite until approved by the Canadian Association.

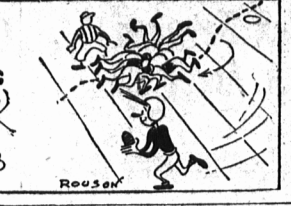
Gil Turner In TKO Victory

Fielding Averages For Major Leagues Compiled

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 — (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds in the National League and New York Yankees and Washington Senators in the American came away with the 1952 individual fielding honors.

Final fielding averages compiled by the Associated Press today showed that the Dodgers contributed third-baseman Billy Cox, catcher Roy Campanella and outfielder Duke Snider to the list of National League defensive leaders while the Redlegs' top men were first-baseman Ted Kluszewski, second-baseman Grady Hatton and outfielder Bob Borkowski.
