S'ide Sportsmen's Dinner Scholarships Being Decided

SUMMERSIDE — Proceeds of \$3,019.50 from the Summerside Sportsmen's Dinner held last February were announced yesterday by James Hogan, general chairman of the event. Of this amount \$1,500 will be given in the form of bursaries to successful students completing grade 12 in Summerside High School this month, will be eligible for consideration by the scholarship selection committee.

The remaining \$1,519.50 will be used for the purpose of providing Canadian football equipment for the students of Summerside High School, in continuation of a football program commenced there last year, that met with enthusiastic response on the part of students.

The scholarship awards which are being made from the revenue of the sportsmen's dinner are entirely apart from two \$500 scholarships which will be presented by the Canadian Legion, and which will be made only to children of veterans of the Canadian armed forces.

Coroner States Death Accidental

No inquest will be held into the death of Ernest Parker, 33, at Hampton yesterday it was decided by Dr. L.E. Frowse, coroner. He said an autopsy showed death was due to cerebral hemorrhage.

Parker was found in the cab of the refrigerated truck by C.M. MacEachern, who operated a service station at Hampton.

LEFT BOARDING HOUSE — Parker was reported to have left his boarding house in Victoria about 4:30 a.m. yesterday, driving his truck toward Bonshaw where he was to pick up a load of meat.

The accident was discovered at 6:15. Parker was still in the cab, which was filled with ammonia gas from the refrigeration equipment, and had to be ventilated before the body could be removed.

The Borden detachment of the RCMP answered the call and coroner Dr. L. E. Frowse pronounced the victim dead on his arrival at the scene.

The victim is the son of Howard Parker, who resides at Carleton. His mother is dead. The funeral will be held Friday from the Cragand United Church at 2 p.m. with interment in Cragand cemetery.

HOYLEAKE, England — Dublin's smiling Joe Carr won his third round match Wednesday in the British amateur golf tournament. The way he did it renewed the confidence of his many admirers, 4,000 of whom followed him to the course.

Carr defeated Bruce Critchley, 19, of England 2 and 1. It wasn't so much the Irishman's improved play that convinced his fans he's the man best suited to this year's lanky 40-year-old has won the crown three times.

The matches cut a deep swathe in the contingent of challengers from the United States, but three of the best of them survived. They are Richard Davies, Robert Sweeney and Pat Brady.

After three days of play, the 360 golfers who began the scramble for the title on Monday have been pared down to 32.

"I've been a bit edgy," he said after beating Critchley, "but now I think I'm through the worst."
