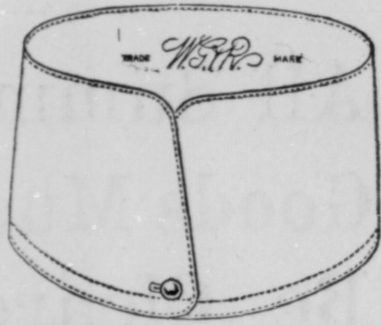

CRISIS IN THE TRANSVAAL

Kruger Bound to Have His Own Way.

PUTS THE VOLKSRaad TO THE TEST

Members on their Marrow Bones Though they Disagree with him.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

PRETORIA, July 25.—President Kruger has been absent from the Government building since last Friday afternoon and it was understood that owing to the opposition shown him by the Legislative Council and Volksraad on the questions of Johannesburg fort and the dynamite monopoly he had arrived at the conclusion that he no longer possessed Volksraads confidence a deputation including General Joubert, Vice-President the hero of Inschelank and Bourger and the chairman of the Volksraad waited upon the President at the Presidency and induced him to attend a special session of Volksraad which lasted over three hours. Meanwhile an anxious crowd assembled outside the building, waiting expectantly to learn the outcome of what was regarded as a momentous debate.

This evening it was announced that the Volksraad had finally assured the President that they had the utmost confidence in him.

It is understood, however, that a majority of the members of the Volksraad still differ with the President on the dynamite monopoly question.

ANOTHER DISPATCH.

LONDON, July 25.—The Johannesburg correspondent of the Standard says: "President Kruger sent a letter to the Volksraad resigning the Presidency in consequence of its refusal to give him a free hand as to the dynamite monopoly. He attended a meeting of the Raad during the consideration of the letter. It is not yet known whether his resignation was conditional." The news was kept secret at Pretoria.

EDMONTON TRAIL.

THE ACADIAN TEACHERS.

Annual Convention At Palmer Road.

The Acadian teachers opened their annual convention on Friday morning at Palmer Road. There was a solemn high mass in the church of the Immaculate Conception before the sessions, the teachers reverting to the grand old practice of invoking the Holy Ghost by a religious service. The officers of the mass were: Rev. S. Boudraut, Egmont Bay, celebrant, Rev. Fathers LeLondais and Gallant, deacons, and Rev. Father Burke, master of ceremonies. Father Chaisson and Fathers Belliveau and Turbide were also present. The spacious church was filled with worshippers. After the post-communion Rev. Father Turbide preached an appropriate charge which was eloquent learned and earnest and must have made a deep impression.

At 10.30 the first session took place in the parish hall, which was gaily decorated with evergreens, flags and Chinese lanterns. Professor Joseph Gallant, President in the chair. The secretary read long and well written minutes of the last convention which were adopted. The Rev. Dr. Chaisson welcomed the Acadian teachers to Palmer's Road. The Rev. P. P. Arsenault then delivered a carefully prepared address upon the "first Acadian teachers" which was much appreciated. Clever speeches were then made by the clergymen present and Prof. Ready and after the adjournment for dinner the regular work of the session was taken up. A number of new members were enrolled. Everything shows the intelligence of the Acadian teachers of the country ably led by Inspector Arsenault, and backed by the clergy in the French centres. There are over fifty Acadian teachers to-day, ten Acadian priests, an Acadian Journal, and two Acadian representatives on the Island against a mere nominal representation as ten years ago. The leaders of the Acadian people are then to be praised for their energy and intelligence and while they have done much, encouraged to still better efforts, as the more advancement made in these lines the better citizens of this dear land will be turned out.

The same officers were re-elected, viz., Joseph S. Gallant, B. A., President, Filias Leclair, Secretary and the old committee of four with the exception of Philias Baote who resigns and is succeeded by William VonDoorbeck.

The convention rose to meet next year at Mount Carmel, after the usual vote of thanks and the Acadian anthem, Ave Marie Stella, and God Save the Queen.

Troops Charged the Rioters.

MUNICH, July 22.—There have been renewed disturbances at Augsburg, where the stone and brick masons are on strike. The strikers attacked a factory employing Italian workmen, and the infantry, cavalry and police were obliged to make repeated charges upon the rioters before they could be dispersed. Many of the mob were injured.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES

Montreal Gazette: Some light is thrown on the Government's binder twine deal by the report of the Minister of Justice on the penitentiaries of Canada. The inspector in his review states that "the output of the binder twine factory, for the year, was awarded to Messrs H. N. Bate & Sons of Ottawa, their offer being the only one submitted." Under such circumstances as are in these words officially described, it is easy to see that Messrs Bate and Son had a good thing in the binder line. But who was looking after the interests of the country and of the poor farmer? How was it that only one tender was submitted?

Sir Wilfrid Laurier now prates glibly about the contingency of war with the States. This is the end of the Liberal negotiations begun with the avowed purpose of settling all questions at issue between the United States and Canada! The Liberal Government had better write "Failure" on its doors and go out.

In the last year of Liberal Conservative rule the expenditures of the Government of Canada were, in round numbers, 41 millions; this year they are about 52 millions. Eleven millions of dollars, a year is rather a high price to pay for the privilege of being ruled by Laurier, Tarte, Blair, Fielding & Co.
