Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP) — A spirited swirl of buying toward the close in western oils and medium-priced coppers climaxed a session-long advance on the stock exchange Friday.
Sharp gains of between 30 and 50 cents in the mining section were marked up to Coast Copper, Kill-embe and warrants, Maritimes, Granduc, Irish Copper and Merrill Island. New Royran, International Rawnick, Iron Dome, Duvana, Consolidate Sudbury and Chiboumagan Explorers were other top winners. Preston East Dome was a 30-cent loser.
Blue Rock advanced 25 cents to \$4, leading the improved uranium, Lake Nordic added 8 cents, Milliken, Rayrock and Pardee firmed about 12 cents.
Great Plains climbed again in western oils with a \$2.37 advance to \$45. Merrill Pete was up \$1.37 at \$17.37. Calgary and Edmonton, Huxley, General Pete, Triad, Canadian Devonian and Dome, Exploration Western were up between 30 and 60 cents. Peace River was down 50 cents.

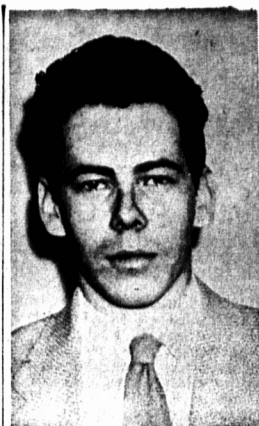

After completing his early schooling at St. Mary's Road East school, the late Mr. Landrigan moved to Murray Harbour North where for some years he operated a lobster packing plant. He later went to Haverhill, Mass., where he worked with the telephone company, only to return to Murray Harbour where he operated a fox ranch. He returned to Murray Harbour and later went to Souris where he opened a woolen mill to manufacture yarn and blankets. Farming Conditions Are Bad Says Second Kings Member

That the present year was the worst economically for the farmers of Prince Edward Island was reported by Harvey Douglas (Liberal) Second Kings, speaking on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday. "It is the worst year since the Conservatives were in power," he added.

He made no apologies for criticisms he had made of the Government on the previous day. "I am surprised that the Opposition Leader did not have more to say about agriculture. Last year he spoke for four hours..."
