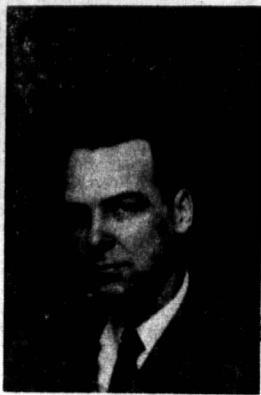


Island Born Scientist Holds Important Post

This year is recorded a further advancement in the outstanding career of island-born scientist, Earle S. Ebers. Effective March 1st, Dr. Ebers assumed the duties of assistant general manager of the Naugatuck Chemical division of the United States Rubber Co., one of the largest corporations engaged in this work in America. He replaced Mr. George Villa, who has been elected vice-president of U.S. Rubber and appointed general manager of the Naugatuck (Conn.) company.

Dr. Ebers is the son of Mr. H.A. Ebers, Charlotetown. As a student, Dr. Ebers had a brilliant scholastic career. Entering Prince of Wales College from West Kent School, he completed the required courses in that institution in one year. At Dalhousie University he gained his bachelor's degree in chemistry, completing the four-year course in three. The next fall saw this accomplished student serving as an assistant in the Chemistry Department of Harvard University, one of America's most distinguished seats of learning. At Harvard, Dr. Ebers obtained a Ph. D. in Chemistry. Later he studied infra-red spectroscopy at Ohio State under a fellowship granted by the Canadian Royal Society.

Dr. Ebers joined the rubber company in 1937 as a research chemist in its general laboratories. In 1946 he became plastics development manager for the chemical division. He was named sales manager for Kralastic and Vibrin resins in 1949, and four years later was appointed director of research and development for the division. He was named general sales

Large Gathering Hear Mrs. MacKay

Mrs. MacKay, Art Supervisor for city schools, spoke to a large gathering at the West Kent Home and School Association on Wednesday, Feb. 20. Mrs. MacKay traced the development of the child in art beginning with the wall scribbling stage. She said that printing the alphabet is really drawing and just as the child learns to make sentences so he learns to draw figures and then to put them together into pictures. Mrs. MacKay believes it is important to teach the child how to draw figures but she does not believe that a child must draw an apple, for example, exactly as it looks. There should be some freedom of interpretation but if necessary the pupil will have to be told how to make the drawing.

Children delight in drawing and should always be encouraged to express themselves. Mrs. MacKay appealed for active art activity in the home for the whole family. The samples of work by West Kent pupils clearly showed the development in the child's ideas of the world around him and in his ability to talk about these things by means of drawings and colours.

The parents enjoyed visiting the classrooms and then gathered for coffee and doughnuts to terminate a very enjoyable evening.

Gives Suspended 2-Year Sentence

Justices Mark R. MacGuigan and George J. Tweedy confirmed the previous conviction of Carl Arsenault of Summerside but changed the penalty to two years suspended sentence in the Court of Criminal Appeal sitting in Charlotetown Wednesday. In the original case against Arsenault on a charge of break, entry and theft, Magistrate Strong sentenced the 15-year-old youth to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary. In addition to the sentence of yesterday, Arsenault is required to enter into a recognizance of \$1,000, consisting of two sureties of \$500, each. He will also be required to report to the Summerside Police Chief every month.

The bench referred the case of Joseph Ivan Arsenault back to the juvenile court yesterday with the former conviction and sentence quashed. He had previously been convicted in the Summerside Magistrate's Court on a similar charge and sentenced to one year in jail.

J.A. Gallant appeared for the appellants while J.P. Nicholson represented the Crown.
