SIR JOHN MACDONALD

STILL LINGERING

THE CASE MORE HOPEFUL

HIS GREAT VITALITY

Messages from the Queen and Most Prominent Men of the British Empire.

OTTAWA, June 1.

Sir John Macdonald's condition is more hopeful. He has been sleeping quietly most of the time, and takes nourishment easily.

The doctors are astounded at his extraordinary vitality.

The general feeling to-day is one of hopefulness that he may survive this attack.

Messages of condolence and enquiry were received from the Queen, Lord Salisbury, Lord Dufferin, and Lord Lansdowne. The Queen desired information of each bulletin issued.

Factory and steamer whistles have been shut off, and every precaution taken to ensure quiet.

Prayers in his behalf were offered yesterday in all the churches.

Sir Leonard Tilley will arrive here to-night.

Parliament meets this afternoon as usual LATEST.

OTTAWA, June 1 (12.50 p. m.).

The condition of the Premier is unchanged. His heart action is weak occasionally, but rallies after nourishment, which he takes freely.

OTTAWA, May 30.

When the news that the Premier was nigh unto death reached the house, the lobbies and the chamber were almost instantly filled with groups of members talking in a low voice on the one topic of the night. Those who were to Sir John's last dinner, Saturday evening, tell how bright and cheerful he was. This morning Sir John Thompson called upon him, and some time during the afternoon he was visited by the Minister of the Interior. To both he spoke lightly of his illness, stating that he would be down to the House again in a few days. He discussed with them details of general and departmental business, showing no less keenness and grasp than usual. Since his illness he has insisted on knowing all that was going on, laughing and saying that he proposed to remain Premier even if he was ill.

It is now announced that some three days ago he suddenly lost power over one arm and hand and missed all feeling in one leg and side. The apparent paralysis passed off suddenly, and in a short time the use of his limbs returned as before. Sir John recognized that his illness was of a serious character, but had no idea that the end should come soon, or before he should have done more parliamentary work.

It is remembered by his friends now that he has often expressed a desire to die in harness without long, weary illness or loss of faculties.

Sir Hector, in moving the adjournment of Mr. Mackintosh's speech said: "I have a painful duty to perform. We have all known that during the past few days the Premier has been lying ill at his residence. This evening a consultation of doctors has been held, and they report that Sir John Macdonald cannot last many hours more. Under these circumstances I move, seconded by Mr. Laurier, the adjournment of the debate."

Mr. Laurier expressed his regret that the painful duty devolved upon him. Under such circumstances, it was fitting that the discussion should cease, and he seconded the motion.

SIR GEORGE STEPHEN

Raised to the Peerage.

LONDON, June 1.

Sir George Stephen, ex-President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been raised to the peerage. This is the first instance of a British colonist being made a member of the House of Lords and a peer of the realm. This shows how the British Government appreciates the Canadian Pacific Railway as a work of Imperial importance.

Russia and the Jews.

LONDON, June 1.

Public indignation against Russia's treatment of the Jews is becoming intense. It is declared that the Czar himself is the chief instigator of those increasing severities and persecutions.

Death of Judge Dorion.

LONDON, June 1.

Sir Antoine A. Dorion died yesterday morning.
