

Stresses Hunting Safety In Rotary Club Address

Mr. H. R. Found of Ellerslie was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club, held yesterday at Howard's Restaurant, president J. C. (Bud) Mountain presiding.

Mr. Found addressed the Rotary gathering on hunting safety, pointing out that carelessness and ignorance are in the main responsible for hunting accidents. He said the solution to this problem lies in education and revealed that the Maritime Wildlife Federation, of which the P. E. I. Fish and Game Association is a member, is inaugurating an educational program of hunting safety in the Maritime Provinces. The guest speaker said this program is planned around two main objectives which are the organized training of hunters in the safe handling of firearms and the enactment of legislation whereby hunting licenses will be issued only to persons who have passed a test qualifying them as safe hunters. Also the prevention of a hunting accident of ever again holding a hunting license.

Mr. Found told the Rotary gathering that the P. E. I. Fish and Game Association is now lining up volunteers to qualify as instructors

Kentville Cited By Fire Ass'n

BOSTON (AP)—A Canadian city has been cited by the National Fire Protection Association, a non-profit educational organization, as a striking example of what can be achieved in preventing fire deaths from faulty oil-burning stoves and heaters.

Reporting on steps to cut the loss of life from this cause, the association notes that more than five years have passed in Kentville, N.S., without fire damage from the more than 900 oil-burning units in the community.

The association says faulty oil-burning stoves and heaters constitute the biggest single cause of fire deaths.

This year, it says, manufacturers, trade associations, fire officials and other authorities have devoted unprecedented attention to reducing such tragedies.

Mental Patients Cost \$2.70 Per Day Last Year

OTTAWA (CP)—Seventy-two mental hospitals in Canada spent an average \$2.70 a day last year to care for each patient, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday.

Salaries and wages took \$1.57 of that amount, with 49 cents spent on food, 15 cents for fuel, power, light and water and 49 cents for other operating expenses.

The bureau said the average daily cost for each patient was lowest in Quebec at \$1.89, and highest in Newfoundland at \$4.35. There were 57,621 patients in mental hospitals at the beginning of 1953, and 60,565 at year's end.

Total operating costs of mental hospitals in the 1953-54 fiscal year rose by about \$5,000,000 from the previous year to \$57,200,000. Revenues fell by more than \$2,000,000 to \$55,200,000. Total operating surplus was \$500,000.

Federal grants totalled \$1,271,936, provincial grants and payments \$44,798,000 and municipal grants \$797,582. Paying patients contributed \$9,021,000.

Make Newsprint From Hardwood

NEW YORK (AP)—The Great Northern Paper Co. after more than a year of experimental operation, has started full commercial production of newsprint from hardwood at its mill in East Millinocket, Me.

Details of the move were made known by Stone and Webster Engineering Corp. of New York, which designed the pilot plant and was awarded the entire expansion construction job. Great Northern's expansion program, begun last year, will cost more than \$45,000,000.

Great Northern's achievement is said to mark the first time quality newsprint utilizing hardwood pulp has been produced on a commercial scale, meaning in volume of a hundred or more tons a day. The new process is capable of pulping a minimum of 150 tons of hardwood a day.

Cardinal Leger Returns Home

MONTREAL (CP)—Cardinal Paul-Emile Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, arrived today by plane after a nine-week visit to Europe that included his "ad limina" visit to the Vatican.

The welcoming delegation at Montreal's Dorval airport included Mgr. J. C. Chaumont, auxiliary bishop of Montreal, and Mayor Jean Drapeau.

Cardinal Leger said he is happy to be home again and carried with him the best wishes of the Pope to the Canadian people. His Eminence visited the ailing pontiff on four occasions towards the end of his tour.

Results Of Examinations By Chartered Accountants

Results of the recent uniform examinations conducted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants have been announced by Prince Edward Island by Mrs. Emma P. Morrison, president of the Prince Edward Island Institute of Chartered Accountants.

Successful students in the primary examinations were: Lowell Andrews, employed by T. Earle Hickey of Summerside, and R. W. Grey, employed by H. R. Doane and Company, Charlottetown.

In the final examinations Mr. R. D. Manning of H. R. Doane and Company was granted a supplemental in accounting, and Mr. A. N. McNeill of McDonald, Currie and Company, Charlottetown, was granted a charter in accounting.

In announcing the results, Mrs. Morrison emphasized that students proceeding towards their chartered accountants degree write examinations which are identical from coast to coast.

This uniformity means that the same level of accounting skill and judgment can be expected of chartered accountants everywhere. Mrs. Morrison said she further pointed out that holding a chartered accountancy certificate not only opens up an interesting and rewarding career in public accounting but sets the course for a fine training in general business. Many chartered accountants are employed as comptrollers, treasurers and internal auditors and the more our economy expands the more chartered accountants will be needed to fill these positions.

Canadians Help Korean Village

OTTAWA (CP)—Christmas came early this month for a small village on So'Chong Do island off the Korean coast.

The welfare committee of the Canadian destroyer Iroquois, before her final Korean patrol, decided to make a clothing collection for village children.

Besides donations for clothing from the ship's company, AB Kenneth Bachelor of Peterborough Ont., and AB William Criland of Toronto raised money to buy shirts, scarves, sweaters and other garments in Hong Kong.

The presentation was made on the last day of the Iroquois' patrol.

Late that same evening, a Korean junk came alongside the Iroquois. Korean civilians and marines had come out through the wind and cold with a gift of plump young chickens for the Canadian sailors.

Drew Making Good Recovery

OTTAWA (CP)—George Drew, national Progressive Conservative leader, plans to spend Christmas with his family at home, where he has been making further recovery from the meningitis infection which sent him to hospital nearly six weeks ago.

Mrs. Drew said Tuesday her husband's recuperation has been "ever so much better" in the two weeks since he left hospital.

MONTREAL (CP)—Representatives of the Montreal branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society and civic officials are planning a marathon blood donor clinic at city hall Dec. 29.
