Winter Carnival Starts Thursday

SOURIS — The third annual Souris Regional High School Ice or Winter Carnival is scheduled for Feb. 3, 4 and 5.

A full schedule of events has been prepared with a few new activities added this year.

Thursday's program will include curling, opening ceremonies, coronation of carnival queen, an exhibition basketball game, a variety concert featuring two folk singers from Charlottetown and to end the evening a hop.

Ice sculpturing events will take place Friday morning with judging at noon. Following that will be the traditional sleigh race, with classes pulling their home room teachers.

Students will then move to the Souris Arena for the ice sports, followed by a broomball game between the teachers and the senior students. Next on the agenda is an ice hop. During the ice hop, dance contests will be held with prizes going to the winners.

COOKOUT AND COASTING

An exhibition hockey game between Souris and Morell Regional High Schools followed by a skate, then back up to the school grounds for a cookout coasting will complete the day's activities.

Saturday morning will see the tug of war followed by a snowball fight between the boys and girls of the school. Later that day in the gym some featured activities are scheduled: basketball game between the boys and girls, murderball between the boys and male teachers, track and field meet and Montague Regional High Schools basketball teams versus Souris Regional High Schools teams.

The presentation of awards by the new carnival queen will follow and a dance will wind up the carnival.

Plante Arriving Today For Sportsmen's Dinner

Jacques Plante, guest speaker at tomorrow night's annual Sportsmen's Dinner at Morell, is scheduled to arrive in the city by air this evening on his first visit to this province.

The colorful, outspoken Plante, who starred in the NHL for 12 seasons, from 1953 to 1965 and is still active in hockey circles as a player, newspaper columnist, and radio-television commentator, will spend tonight in Charlottetown and will travel to Morell tomorrow at noon to take part in their program.

In the afternoon, Plante will conduct a hockey clinic in the Morell Community Hall, starting at 2:30. He will be assisted by David Boswell, provincial director of physical fitness, and Aquinas Ryan, athletic director at Morell Regional High School.

The hockey clinic, at which Plante will be chief instructor, will include slides and films to illustrate hockey techniques, talks, questions and answers, and a session on the ice at Morell rink, if ice conditions permit. The clinic is open to anyone in the province, particularly to people who are connected with minor, high school, or intermediate hockey in Kings County.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says late Sunday evening an intense storm moving slowly northward from Vermont was giving rain or snow, and extremely strong winds to all regions.

This storm is expected to edge into Quebec by this morning. Once it is north of the district colder air will sweep in from the west, temperatures will drop and rain change to snowflurries in most regions. In northern New Brunswick, however, being closer to the storm center, snow will be continuous and four to eight inches may be expected.

Regional forecasts:

Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Wind warning continued; overcast, snow, occasionally mixed with rain, changing to snowflurries this morning; turning colder; winds southeasterly 35, gusts to 60, diminishing and shifting to southerly 30 gusts to 50 this morning and to westerly 25 gusts to 40 in the afternoon, early morning and mid afternoon temperatures at Charlottetown and Moncton 30 and 25, Fredericton and Saint John 28 and 20.

High tide today at Charlottetown 5:26 a.m. and 4:59 p.m. At Rustico at 12:49 pm Summerside this-sighted minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 7:23 a.m. and sets at 5:30 p.m.

East Fishermen Agree On Lobster Trap Limit

At a meeting held in the Murray Harbour Public Hall on Jan. 25, with John MacNeill acting as chairman, 30 fishermen from Murray Harbour and Beach Point who fish lobsters in the areas known as the Cape Bear Reef and the upshore grounds agreed to a 600-trap limit per boat.

They also agreed that where there was a loss of traps there would be no replacement made during the season.

It was moved by Laurie Herring that each fisherman have a maximum of 10 traps per jump. This motion was seconded by Laurie Herring and carried unanimously.
