

Eden Accuses Russians Of Nauseating Hypocrisy

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Eden has accused the Russians of "nauseating hypocrisy" in lecturing Britain about the Middle East and challenging them to invite United Nations forces into Hungary.

In a fighting speech Saturday before 4,000 delegates at a Young Conservative rally in Royal Festival Hall, Eden said:

"United Nations observers have not been allowed on Hungarian soil, let alone a United Nations force. If they were, those long trains with their tragic loads would not go rumbling eastwards."

"Why should not the Soviets accept United Nations observers and invite United Nations forces into Hungary?"

Eden then told his audience: "For a country to enslave Hungary and at the same time to lecture us for our action in Egypt is nauseating hypocrisy. . . how dare they lecture others who have not done these things."

Eden said the British-French invasion of Egypt had blocked a Communist plot in the Middle East—a

plot which would have led to "the loss of countless lives and more other evils than we can ever estimate."

Disruptive influences had been at work and "the deep divide" between the Communist nations and the Western world had been secretly dug beneath the surface of the Middle East states.

"I can assure you that even the effect of the ships sunk in the Suez canal is a temporary worry compared with the disaster this must have meant for us all."

LONG OVATION

Eden was given a three-minute ovation by the Young Conservatives on entering the hall, but when he was five minutes into his speech, Miss Rosine Boune Viale, 40, a member of the League of Empire Loyalists, leaped to the platform and advanced on the prime minister.

She was hustled off by detectives as she shouted:

"How many times are you going to scuttle from Suez?"

The prime minister recalled the failure of the original proposal to

give the UN Security Council a military staff and forces.

"Since this conception failed, it is folly to behave as though it had succeeded and to shut our eyes to the fact that the UN is not the world order which it was intended to be. . . the UN was set up to discourage law-breaking, not to make it safe."

"Surely it was never the intention that if the UN could not act its members should not be allowed to take action to protect the interests of peace itself."

LAW UNDERMINED

"If the use of force was resorted to when law could not command, then the rule of law was being undermined."

"Whether we like it or not we are confronted with the fact that force is an integral part of the policy of some nations. We have just witnessed an appalling example of this in Hungary. This was a terrible portent for the world. Neither Europe nor the East nor the American continent can blind themselves to its implications."

Measures To Prevent Mixing White And Non-White In S. A.

(This is the second of two articles reporting on South Africa's preparatory work for permanent separation of the races.)

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—The word bans in the Afrikaans tongue means master. In South Africa it is synonymous with the white man, and the government of Prime Minister J. G. Strijdom is determined to prevent this from ever changing.

But it is also commonly accepted here that both whites and blacks have an equal claim to South Africa as their homeland. And the government declares that its program to keep the races always separate is in the best interests of the non-European in South Africa—the African natives, the "coloreds" of mixed blood and the Indians from Asia.

Indians have never been permitted to vote. African natives had the franchise on the same basis as whites in one of the country's four provinces until 1936, but now all Africans are on a separate voting roll. They elect as their representatives four white senators and also white members of Parliament and the provincial councils. In addition, the government appoints four white senators on the basis of their knowledge of the needs of the colored races.

CONSTITUTION INVOLVED

It is the status of the voters of mixed African and other blood that brought a constitutional cleavage. In 1951 the government packed the Senate so that it could get a two-thirds majority to remove the coloreds from the common voting roll. The Senate passed the bill by the required margin.

The 1951 legislation put the coloreds on a separate roll and permitted them to choose four white members of Parliament plus white representatives on the provincial councils.

A week ago the appeals court upheld the government's action in removing the coloreds from the common roll. Only one of the 11 judges dissented.

RESERVATION SYSTEM

Although the government denies full political rights to the Africans, it is trying to establish a system of local self-government for them. Native tribal, territorial and regional authorities have been set up in the purely African areas.

The reserves are to be developed as the Africans' national homeland. Whites are denied rights in these areas just as Africans are denied rights in the white areas.

The government says it is spending more than \$112,000,000 on housing, health services, education and recreation for the Africans—a 11 aimed at giving them greater opportunities for advancement to serve their own people.

A controversy has been brewing over African primary and secondary schooling. The ministry of native affairs decided the natives' education should have its roots in the spirit and being of Bantu society. What this meant wasn't made clear. There were fears that African children would not receive a rounded education. However, educationists now agree that the curricula prepared for the native schools appear sound.

The government took over most church mission schools last year under the Bantu Education Act. The Anglican bishop of Johannesburg closed 23 Anglican schools rather than turn them over to the government.

Under the government the number of students in African schools has increased from 950,000 to 1,100,000. But to make this growth possible, the elementary school day has been divided into two sessions of three hours each for different groups of pupils.

Indians also have their own schools. There has never

been a demand for admission of non-whites to white schools, although the standards of white schools are much higher.

About \$25 a pupil a year is spent for education of the Africans in primary and secondary schools. The pre-student expenditure for the more than 500,000 children in white schools is about \$140. The expenditure for 230,000 coloreds and nearly 90,000 Indians in their separate schools averages about \$25 a year.

There is also segregation in the general economic life of the country. Certain types of work are regarded as exclusively for whites. Others are considered beneath their dignity.

The government currently is preparing regulations to label the blood of non-white donors with a black sticker to prevent its being given accidentally to whites.

Whites earn far more than other races. The average annual wage for men employed in manufacturing industries is \$1,500 for whites, \$600 for coloreds, \$307 for Indians and \$362 for Africans.

STRIKES OUTLAWED

Law prohibits African trade unions and bans strikes and lock-outs of African workers.

Notices on benches at bus stops, railroad stations, parks and public gardens say, "Slegs vir blankes Europeanen only."

There are separate train coaches where there are not separate trains.

Whites do not play non-whites at any sport. All-white teams represent the country in international events like the Olympics.

By custom there is social separation. Hotels, restaurants, mov-
