

# Clue There All The Time To Mad Bombers Identity

NEW YORK (AP)—The Mad Bomber's 16-year reign of terror was over Tuesday, even as he nursed the explosives for another New York foray.

"I'm glad I did it," 53-year-old George Metesky told news papermen as he was brought here in handcuffs from his Waterbury, Conn., home.

Then he added:

"I'm sorry I injured people."

Metesky was arrested Monday night. He signed a statement that he planted 32 bombs in public places in New York.

He is a stocky, grey, tubercular man with a spindly air about him. His bombs injured 15 persons but no one was killed. He was quoted as saying it never was his intention to take human life.

Metesky probably will be charged under a New York anti-bomb law that carries a maximum 25 years in prison upon conviction. But his sanity almost certainly would be an issue.

Waterbury's chief inspector Joseph R. Bendler said the bomber invaded New York's Coliseum last month when the auto show was on. Tens of thousands of exhibitors and visitors were there. Metesky was quoted as saying he had a home-made pipe bomb with him and intended to plant it. But Bendler said the bomber decided it was too weak—that its explosive roar would not sound impressive enough.

So, Bendler said, Metesky returned to Waterbury. There, with care, he fashioned a bigger bomb with a louder "boom" to it. It was one of three Bendler said

was found after Metesky's arrest. Metesky embarked on his career in 1940 because he fancied Consolidated Edison Company had cheated him out of compensation for an injury.

**CLUE ALWAYS THERE**

The clue to the bomber's identity lay in the files of the city's huge gas-electric utility. It has been under their very noses for years.

It was the Bomber, himself, who brought about his capture. Beginning last Dec. 27, the Bomber sent the first of four letters to the New York Journal-American. They were prompted by the newspaper's series of open letters urging the Bomber to give himself up and promising him legal protection.

In each letter, the man revealed a little more of his background. From the tone of the letters he did so willingly, as though he deliberately wished to invite capture.

His last letter was dated Jan. 18. In it were details which sent Consolidated Edison back once more to the files they had been combing for years.

Last Friday, Alice G. Kelly, who has worked for the utility for 25 years, came across a file of six threatening letters Metesky had written to the company since 1935.

"As I pulled this typewritten letter I knew I had something," Miss Kelly said.

home made pipe bomb was found Nov. 18, 1940, in a Consolidated Edison powerhouse on the upper west side of Manhattan.

Police gave the Journal-American full credit for events leading up to the bomber's capture.

There was a \$26,000 reward for the Mad Bomber's capture.

Every last man of the 23,000-member New York Police Force was thrown into the hunt at one time or another.

Down the years, his devices were found in railway terminals, movie houses, big Broadway motion picture palaces, and public buildings. His bombs actually exploded in Grand Central Terminal, Radio City Music Hall, Pennsylvania Station and Brooklyn's Paramount Theatre. Others were found before they blew up.

**INSURED IN 1932**

Consolidated Edison said its files indicated Metesky was a \$30-a-week employee of the utility in 1932 when he was injured by a boiler flash-back. The files listed Metesky as having received sick pay and a group insurance settlement for his injury.

However, Metesky claimed he contracted tuberculosis as a result of his injury. A mild looking man with small blue eyes, he began seeking compensation for what he considered total disability. Three times he was refused.

Some of Metesky's neighbors considered him "a nice guy." Others said he had the fustiness of a crotchety old woman, and showed marked distaste for the day-to-day intrusions of neighborhood children onto his premises.

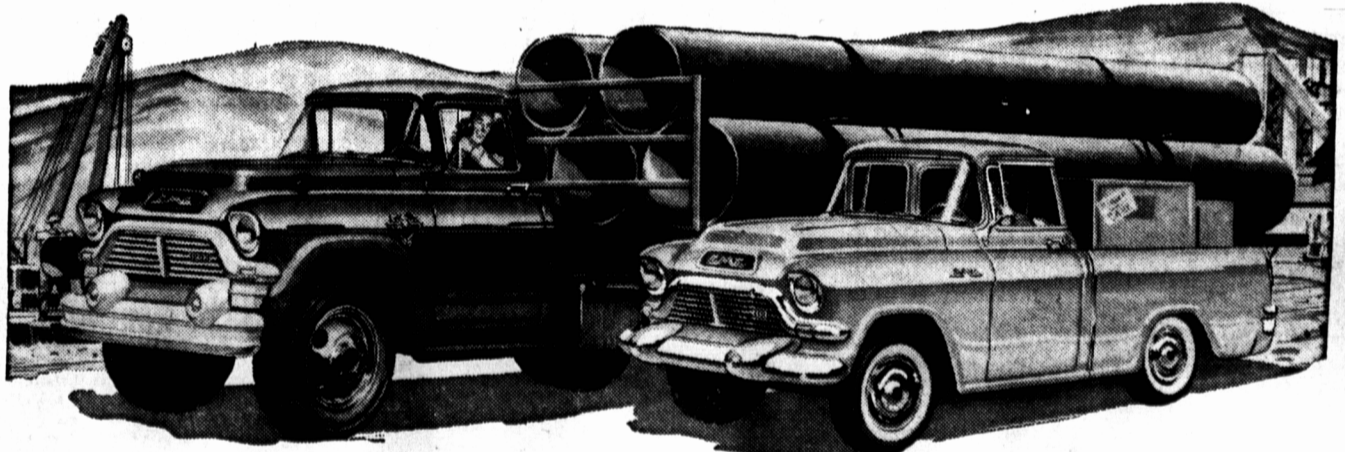
