Amazement Expressed At Lack Of Comment

A member of the P.E.I. Boundaries Commission said yesterday "the commission is amazed at the lack of comment" on the commission report published last Saturday.

He said the new boundaries proposal was something that affected everyone in the province. "Changes much smaller than this in legislation many times have raised a storm of comment."

The commission member said lack of public comment could be because of "complete acceptance of the commission proposals, indifference on the part of the public to the proposed electoral boundaries changes, or such complete disgust with the report that no one is bothering to comment."

The commission proposes the elimination of the province's

dual riding of Queens and the creation of four new constituencies with populations ranging from 22,307 to 38,050. The ridings would be named Cardigan, Hillsborough, Malpeque and Egmont. The three existing ridings are Prince, Queens and Kings.

HEARINGS SCHEDULED

The four-member commission has scheduled public hearings for five communities in the province between June 24 and July 29 to hear representations about its recommendations.

To date, the commission office in Charlottetown has not received any notice that representations will be made.

Persons wishing to appear before the commission are required by law to give notice in writing within 23 days of the publication of the report, that is, by May 17.

The commission member said "I hope we won't have to go to the hearings in the several communities and then adjourn because of lack of interest in making representations."

Each province has an electoral boundaries commission and this province's commission was the first to publish its report.

Canada's chief electoral officer, Nelson Castonguay, is a member of each provincial commission. Other members of this province's commission are a chairman, Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy; deputy provincial secretary, Wendall MacKay, and Frank MacMillan, teacher at Prince of Wales College.

Ottawa Rep. Visits P.E.I. From May 10

Phillip Aitken of Ottawa will meet with representatives of local industry to discuss production problems when he visits the province the week of May 10.

Mr. Aitken, a representative of the National Research Council, is expected to be accompanied on his visits to Island processing facilities by B. Graham Rogers, provincial transportation director.

Mr. Rogers said Mr. Aitken's visit here is part of a continuing program in which the provincial department of industry and natural resources cooperates with the national council in giving assistance to industries that have technical problems.

Six-Month Extension Given Plant

Hon. Andrew MacRae, minister of agriculture, has announced the government cold storage plant on Esplanade Street will continue in operation for the next six months.

The decision was reached at a meeting between the minister and members of the Industrial Corporation.

The plant will now remain in operation until Nov. 1 when the facilities will be sold. There have been suggestions that private interests may take over and operate a plant.
