The Kasier's Latest.

BERLIN, Feb. 9.—Emperor William speaking at the annual banquet of the Brandenburg Diet said

"The Hohenzollerns have always considered themselves responsible to God personally for their acts and a sense of responsibility to the people has been inherited by ever Hohenzollern."

"When I stood on the Mount of Olives I renewed the oath taken to the colors not to leave a stone unturned to assure the welfare of the people."

His Majesty recalled Marshal Von Moltke's words to Prince Bismarck after the Franco-German war: "Now is the time to see the tree grow," and said:

"I will be a good gardener to the tree of the German Empire, lopping off the branches which impede its growth and extirpating obnoxious root gnawers."

The Emperor then alluded to the universal efforts being made to maintain peace and declared that Germany "must stand united, like a bronze rock, against any attempt to disturb peace."

He added: "Peace must be preserved at home and abroad."

BRITISH SHIPYARDS BUSY.—The shipyards on the Thames, Tyne and Clyde are building more ships for the British Navy than ever before. All the Royal dockyards are working over time. As an instance of the energy displayed it may be stated that in March, 1898, the battleship Goltah, 12,950 tons was launched at Chatham, and within three weeks the Irresistible's keel plate was laid. The Irresistible, 15,000 tons, was launched in December, and last month the battleship Venerable, 15,000 tons, was laid down. Thus, three battleships have occupied one slip within ten months, a world's record.
