

# Mays Hits Record 535th; Orioles Again Down Sox

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants became the greatest right-handed homer hitter in baseball Wednesday when he tagged No. 535 of his career in the fourth inning of a game against St. Louis.

Mays' homer, a loft over the right field fence on a 3-2 pitch by Ray Washburn, pulled him out of a tie for second place with Jimmy Fox on the all-time homer list. The only player ever to hit more homers than Mays is Babe Ruth, who hit 714 during his major league career. Mays pulled into a tie with Fox Tuesday night when he hit the 534th of his career. But he came up in the fourth inning with one out and slammed a drive over the fence for his 30th homer of the season, the ball carrying on a line into a mob of children standing by the bleachers. As Mays trotted around the bases, the estimated crowd of 16,000 rose in its feet and gave him a standing ovation. Mays first jogged into the Giant dugout, then headed the applause and came out and tipped his hat.

BOSTON (AP) — Luis Aparicio collected five hits and Frank Robinson collected three hits and two runs batted in Wednesday, leading Baltimore Orioles to an 8-4 victory over Boston Red Sox.

Right hander Jim Palmer posted his 14th victory with relief help from Stu Miller as the American League-leading Orioles completed a sweep of a three-game series. The Orioles picked up an un-

earned run in the first and added single rallies in the third and fourth before exploding for five runs in the ninth inning en route to their eighth victory in nine games.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Leon Wagner slammed a three-run homer in the seventh inning, boosting Cleveland Indians to a 5-3 victory over Washington Senators Wednesday night.

Larry Brown singled in another run in the seventh as the Indians wiped out a 3-1 Washington lead.

Rocky Colavito also hit his 26th homer for the Indians—a solo shot in the sixth inning. Washington starter Pete Richter contributed to his own

# International Tuna Cup Match

Let me say at the outset that it is my considered opinion that Tuna fishing with rod and reel will never become a great spectator sport in fact I'm reminded of the classic line penned by Damon Runyon who described an America's Cup Yacht Race by saying that it had "All the tenseness and excitement of watching the grass grow."

After two full days of bobbing about on grey fog shrouded seas and watching some of the world's most experienced big game fishermen vainly trying to entice Giant Blue Fin Tuna to the bait you begin to share in their obvious frustration.

Only two fish have been hooked in the first two days of this seventeenth International Tuna Cup Match, and both fish won their battles.

James Anderson, captain of this year's United States entry had a fish on for only seven minutes during the first day's fishing and then lost out when the Tuna streaked under the boat and broke the 130 pound test line like a piece of string.

During the second day Alexander Marchessini, captain of the Greek team, hooked a fish and fought a whale of a battle for over an hour. His undoing came when the line tangled with a sunken lobster trap. Being went the line, and away went Mr. Tuna for parts unknown.

But the most frustrating part of this whole business for fishermen and match officials is the obvious fact that there are plenty of fish around. Both on soldier's rip, the famed Tuna "Hotspot" off Wedgeport, and Cape St. Marys Fish have been spotted in numbers as they break the surface in a feeding frenzy.

The question now is: Why aren't they taking the bait? On Tuesday I was with the press party at Cape St. Marys, and when the thick fog finally rolled back for a few hours we saw plenty of evidence to attest to the fact that fish are around in quantity.

Through held glasses we

could see the suns and splash-est and the spittle, re-created shaped dorsal fins gliding above the surface as the Tuna chased Baifish to the top.

We sat and shared the fishermen's frustration as they circled back and forth over the high school, trolling at fast speed, medium speed and slow speed. They tried drift fishing, trolling baits, Herring, Mackerel and Squid but just nothing seemed to work.

In fact at one point one boat captain swore he would put lipstick on the bait to see if that would add any seductiveness to the lure.

The last time this match got a skunking was in 1956, and that led to the cancellation of the match until last year when the Americans snatched the Agton R. Sharp Trophy from the Caribbean team by landing the biggest fish of the tournament in the final hour of the four day fishfest.

You can sense a certain worried quality at match headquarters now as the unholy prospect of another fishless tournament looms up.

However, there are two full days of fishing ahead, and no fisherman worth his bait ever gives up hope altogether. It could happen that the fish will suddenly start to take and if they do there could well be a real bonanza. The day before the match started for instance, three boats who had been out all day suddenly hooked fish within minutes of each other, and all three Tuna were boated.

That's the kind of action everybody here at match headquarters is hoping for as the final two days of fishing begin this morning.

It will take a little better weather, and a whole lot of fishermen's luck to pull it off. That and some very hungry Tunafish.

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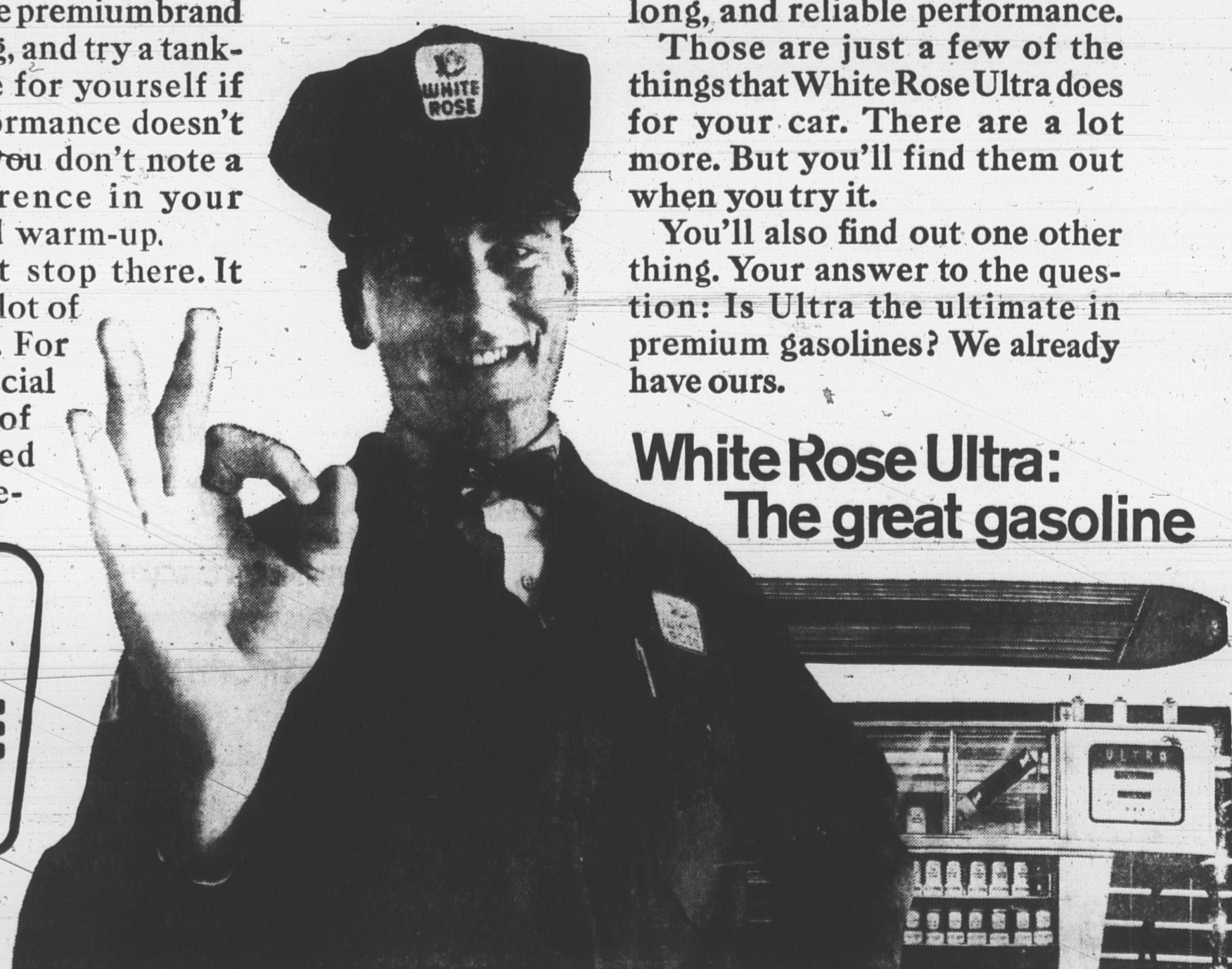
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
