

Valuable Louisburg Relic.

(Sydney correspondence Hants Journal.)

There is to be seen on the premises of the late Capt. George Burchell, Sydney, a breech-loading cannon, brought up some few years on the fluke of an anchor in the harbor of Louisburg, and which was purchased by Capt. Burchell from the man who found it. It is quite an important relic. French officers who have called there expressly to see it, claim that it is of French manufacture, that they have information leading them to believe that only three guns were made of that pattern, one of which, the exact counterpart of that at Sydney, is now in the tower of London, and bears the date of the sixteenth century. The third gun has not yet been traced by the French officers who have been in search of it. The gun at Sydney is very much rusted. The barrel (which is about 2 1/2 inches in diameter in the bore) has the appearance of having been originally formed of wrought iron about one inch in thickness, made from sections of cast iron in a barrel, held together by hoops of iron hoops on bands about five inches apart, these hoops being made apparently from iron about 3 1/2 feet long. On the breech end is a projecting strap of heavy iron, evidently intended to hold the breech block which secured the charge. Near the end of this strap or frame are two slots to admit keys to hold the breech block in place. The gun is mounted on an swivel, to enable it to be moved in any direction, while at the end of the breech strap is a handle by which the operator could move it up and down to secure the required elevation. This is indeed a valuable relic, and does away with the idea that the breech-loading cannon is a modern invention. So far as we can learn, the existence of this relic is known as yet to only a comparatively small number of persons. It is now in the possession of Mrs. Burchell.

General Telegraphic News.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 26.—Russian winter wheat crops are in a satisfactory condition except in 16 provinces.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A Hamburg despatch says 172 new cases and 69 deaths from cholera were reported there on Thursday. Nine hundred emigrants about to sail for New York have abandoned the voyage. All fairs and public dancing assemblies have been prohibited.

RICHMOND, Que., Aug. 26.—A number of French-Canadians passed through here today from the New England States to settle in Northern Ontario, and say 200 will follow from Lowell before long.

TORONTO, Aug. 26.—A great gathering of Salvationists took place last night to be the statement of Brigadier Philpot, the leader of the revolt against Commander Booth and army management. Philpot defended himself against him, and the audience passed a resolution endorsing his conduct and condemning Booth, and another pledging support to Philpot. The ex-brigadier then made serious charges against Commissioner Rees' extravagance, and also alleging that he sold Army property, of which no account was kept. He further charged that the self-denial fund of \$12,000 last year was not used to meet the Army debt in Canada, but was banked in Toronto for the private use of the head officers, who lived in luxury while the poor officers at outlying posts were starving.
