The large number of wedding presents of silverware, cut glass, etc., testify to the popularity of the young couple, to whom the Guardian extends heartfelt congratulations.

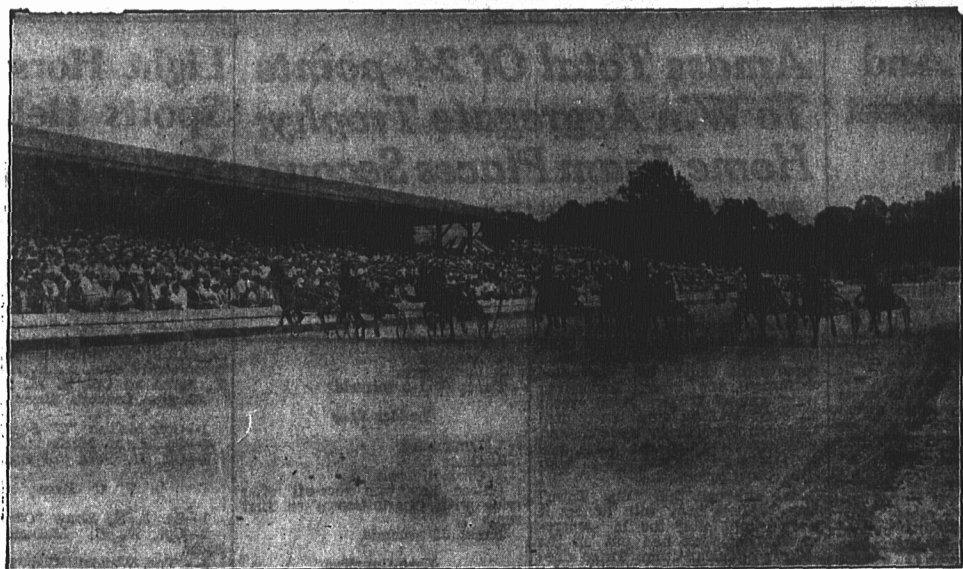
AMERICAN VISITORS TOUR JASPER PARK
