Report \$3,000 Surplus From Lobster Carnival

Question Political Moves In CNR Auditor's Change

OTTAWA (CP) — A change in CNR auditors raised Commons questions Thursday about political favoritism.

George McIlraith (L.—Ottawa West) said the appointment of James A. de Lalanne of Montreal to audit CNR accounts for 1958 smacks of political patronage.

"CNR accounts had been audited 'efficiently' every year but one since 1923 by George A. Touche and Company, also of Montreal. Mr. McIlraith wondered why the government was 'discarding all that experience'."

Mr. McIlraith added that Mr. de Lalanne was a defeated Progressive Conservative candidate—a reference to the fact that Mr. de Lalanne ran unsuccessfully during the 1949 federal election in the Montreal riding of St. Antoine—Westmount. The winning candidate was then finance minister Douglas Abbott, now a Supreme Court justice.

Transport Minister Hees described Mr. McIlraith's statements as "cheap." He denied that political considerations influenced the appointment.

Mr. Hees said the government wanted to break a "monopoly" and give free enterprise an opportunity.

Douglas Fisher (COF—Port Arthur) complimented Mr. Hees on his "trust-busting" activities and expressed hope the minister would soon be "skirmishing" with Canada's large corporations. The 197 annual report of the government-owned CNR—a huge operation with rail operating revenues of \$753,000,000—gives no indication of the amount paid to audit its complex books.

The propriety of Mr. de Lalanne's appointment was discussed before the Commons passed a bill authorizing funds to cover certain CNR capital expenditures.

A gala dessert: Pineapple Whipped Cream Roll

Gradually beat in 1 c. granulated sugar
Stir in 1 tsp. grated orange rind 1/2 c. orange juice
Sift in dry ingredients, part at a time, fold lightly. Turn into greased jelly roll pan lined with greased waxed paper. Bake at 375°, 15 mins. Sprinkle towel with fruit sugar. Turn out hot cake on towel; peel off paper, trim edges; roll up in towel. Cool.

Prepare 1/2 c. drained canned crushed pineapple, 1/4 c. toasted coconut, 1 tsp. chopped maraschino cherries. Soften 1 1/2 tsp. gelatine in 1 tsp. water; melt over hot water. Cool. Beat 1/2 pint whipping cream until thick; add gelatine; beat until stiff. Beat in 2 tbsps. granulated sugar.

Add 1/4 tsp. vanilla or rum flavoring, 1/4 tsp. grated orange rind, prepared fruits, coconut. Unroll cake, spread with filling; re-roll. Chill several hours or overnight. Yield: 8 to 10 slices. For finest baking results use Magic.
