all small boys he went to his room, but instead of getting into his bed he stood at the window for a time looking out. He was surprised to see the men of the family carrying some heavy object from the shore. In the moonlight he watched them carefully bury it in a nearby field.

Several years later he moved to Boston and spent many years in that city. About 10 years ago when he was nearing 80 he came back to the island for a visit and naturally wanted to see the old farm on which he grew up. It is now owned by Mr. Vincent Macdonald, of Valleyfield. While calling there he related the story as told above. The Macdonald family hunted for two or three years to find the "buried treasure", but without success and gradually the story was almost forgotten.

This spring a piece of metal was noted sticking from the ground near one of the outbuildings. The other day the old story was recalled and Lloyd Macdonald, son of the owner, started digging in the area. He unearthed a piece of steel approximately 15 feet long, weighing nearly 1000 pounds. It is in perfect condition even after more than 80 years. Although many people have viewed it none can figure what it was used for, nor the motive in hiding it so secretly. Could it have been part of the first space ship from another planet?
