Did pesky fowls scratch up our plantings of springing the potential fragility and liveliness of the cornflowers among others, the gay velvets of the nasturtiums?

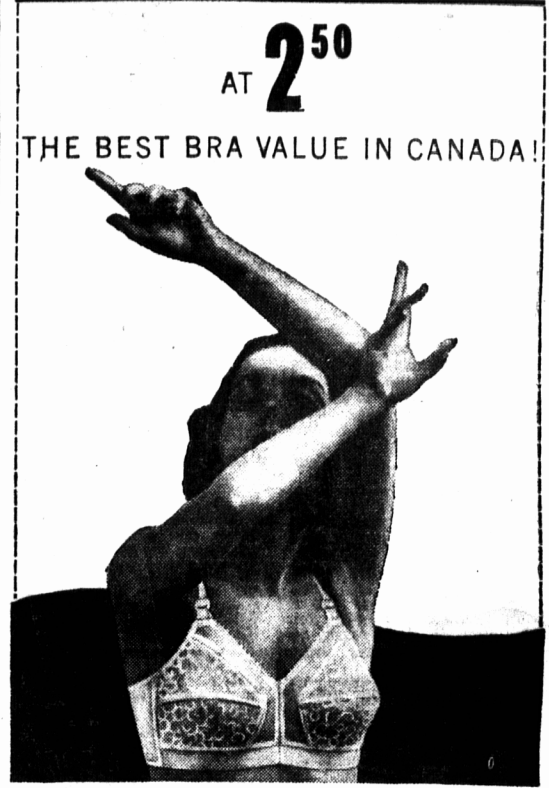
