Alberton Committee To Seek Rink Support

ALBERTON — A five-member committee was appointed at a well attended meeting last evening to meet with Alberton Town Council and the Alberton Prince County Exhibition Association to discuss the feasibility of building a skating rink in Alberton.

Committee members are Robert Campbell, Thomas Barbour, Kenneth Pridham, Erskine Hardy and Everett Cahill.

Alton Raynor, Douglas Adams and Thiren Ellis, members of O'Leary Athletic Association who took an active part in the construction last year of O'Leary community rink, attended the meeting and gave valuable advice and information concerning the problems of acquiring materials, financing and labor problems.

Mayor Roy Leard stressed the need for a rink in the town and offered the full support of the town council in the project.

Lloyd Gaudet, principal of Alberton Regional High School, presented some facts and figures on the new rink in Moncton.

On motion of Councillor Norman Hardy a vote of thanks was tendered the O'Leary club members for their valued advice and support. A further meeting is to be held in two weeks time to hear the report of the rink information committee.

Herbert Matthews presided over the meeting which was held in the WI Hall. Minutes were recorded by William Cain.

Survey Is Completed On Sports Activities

A survey of amateur sport and physical fitness carried out recently in the province reveals that about one dollar per capita is being spent on these types of activities.

Director of physical education, David Boswell, said he received assistance in the survey from agencies and organizations in the province, which deal with sport and fitness.

SURVEY PURPOSE

Main purpose of the survey was to have a record of physical education and sport activities to back up any request that the province may make for a share of the recent \$6,000,000 federal fund set up to assist physical fitness.

"It is not known," said Mr. Boswell, "whether or not the survey will have any bearing on what amount of federal assistance this province will receive. The survey, however, did provide us with a great deal of information as to what is being done and what money is being spent in the province on amateur sport and physical fitness."

Commenting on the finding that about one dollar per capita is being spent in the province on sports and fitness programs, Mr. Boswell said that three dollars per capita would provide "an adequate, or at least a satisfactory, program for the province."

Several recommendations were included in the survey, and these are expected to be forwarded to federal authorities by Dr. George Dewar, provincial minister of education.

Legislature Session Expected To Be Busy

With the regular session of the provincial legislature expected to open within two months, speculation is rife as to what legislation will be introduced.

Premier Walter R. Shaw said recently that he doesn't expect "more than the usual amount of legislation to be brought up at the coming session."

This, however, could mean that there will be as many as 80 pieces of legislation, as last year there were about that many, and that session was also forecast as being one that would not see "more than the usual amount of bills."

High on the list of probable legislation this year is the setting up of a provincial civil service commission. The P.E.I. Public Servants Association passed a resolution favoring this idea and forwarded it to the

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says cold air will spread across the Maritimes, beginning in northern New Brunswick about dawn and finally reaching eastern Nova Scotia in the afternoon. Clearing weather should follow as the cold air becomes established. Snowfall accumulations of two or three inches may be expected in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick.

Regional forecasts:
Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island: Cloudy with intermittent rain changing in afternoon to snowflurries, clearing by evening; colder this evening; southwest winds 20 with gusts to 35 shifting in afternoon to north 25 and diminishing in the evening to north 15. Low-high at Halifax 32 and 38, Yarmouth 35 and 38, Kentville 32 and 35, New Glasgow, Goshen and Sydney 30 and 37, Charlottetown 28 and 32. Eastern N.B. counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Mostly overcast with snow, occasionally mixed with rain, clearing in afternoon; turning colder in afternoon; north winds 20. High-low at Moncton 28 and 25, Fredericton 25 and 20, Saint John 30 and 25.

Upper St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Overcast with intermittent snow clearing late in morning; colder; north winds 20. High-low at Edmundston 20 and 10, Campbellton 15 and 10. Bay of Fundy: Southwest winds 30 shifting during morning to north 30 and diminishing in afternoon to north 20; cloudy with intermittent snow occasionally mixed with rain ending in afternoon. Visibility 10 miles; lowering in precipitation to two to four miles; turning much colder in afternoon.
