Mr. BEER moved that the report be referred back to the Committee for the purpose of being amended, as moved by him in Committee.

Mr. CAMPBELL moved that Mr. Beer have leave to withdraw his amendment.

Mr. BEER moved the previous question, and the question being put upon the main motion that the report of the Committee be received, it was carried unanimously. 10 At 3 40 a. m. the House adjourned till 10 a. m. the same day.

A Summer Resort.

For salubrity, graceful variety, rich verdure, pleasant sea-bathing, and moderate cost to visitors, the Island presents advantages scarcely equalled, and certainly not surpassed, in any of the Maritime Provinces. Each year visitors from outside are finding their way quietly and in increasing numbers to this fair Isle. Entering the Province here or at Summerside, they distribute themselves to the different points at which they have been informed they can find suitable accommodation. That most in favor is the quiet farmhouse in which a few persons or a family can be accommodated near to the sea. At Malpeque a goodly number of visitors, some of them American are to be found. At Rustico, and Stanhope (Mrs. Shaw's) similar resorts exist. Near to Summerside, and other points on the south shore, where the atmosphere, during summer, is suited to the wants of delicate persons and children, accommodation is in growing demand. The visitors of one year, advise their friends to go to the localities which they had previously found attractive.

Last year a few groups of Canadian and American visitors who spent a few months with us, furnished a pleasant element to the society of the place, spent some money in the stores, and found for themselves health, pleasure and new friends. They all expressed themselves warmly as to the kindness and accessibility of the people whom they met in business intercourse and in private life.

Could we not advantageously encourage this business? With the town as general headquarters, Rocky Point, West River, North River, the Harbor's Mouth, Southport and Keppoch might receive and comfortably accommodate a large number of desirable strangers. In this manner people from the other Provinces would be led to know more about us, where and how we live, and mould opinions of their friends elsewhere respecting us? Could those who may have suitable accommodation to offer, not leave information at the newspaper offices, in a form immediately available to strangers on their arrival? This would not seriously affect the interests of our hotels, or of such an establishment as the Seaside Hotel at Rustico. General travel would follow in the wake of an enlarged volume of holiday seekers.

We have good reason to believe that it lies in our power to attract year after year a growing number of outside people to our shores with mutual advantage. As business intercourse extends, so will personal interest and friendly ties be formed.

While on this subject we may remark that there is now room for a modest summer hotel in or near the city, provided it were commodious and airy. It would not need to be expensive in interior finish. A portion of it adapted for winter occupancy, could be used as a general boarding house and residence of the manager all year. Such a project would pay indirectly in pecuniary advantages to every substantial property owner in the city; and after a few years, if conducted with taste and judgment, might pay a dividend on the capital invested. Is there not a large sum of money lying unemployed that might be put to good use in this way? A proper locality and a project commenced on a plan and scale that would admit of extension as circumstances might require, would be of great moment in such a matter, nearness to the park or to the esplanade, would be worth considering. Perhaps some of the private properties in such neighborhoods might be obtained and extensions made.

The proprietors of the Osborne House evidently have faith in the possibility of accommodating profitably, a larger number of guests than they can receive at present. The Revere House, recently enlarged and improved, indicates progress in a similar direction. Let us have faith in the possibilities of our position, and they will soon become actualities. There is no reason, if we show well-considered enterprise, why our fair Island should not become the pleasure-ground of the eastern part of the Dominion, and of some of the States of the neighboring Republic. Nature has endowed us richly in some respects. Let our own sagacity and enterprise do the rest. The reward will be ample. We shall return to this subject again.

OTTAWA, April 21.

The resolution exempting vessels under eighty tons paying harbor dues more than twice a year at Pictou, passed yesterday. The House then went into Committee of Supply.

A By-Law amending the Law relating to Dogs, and the Taxing thereof.

Passed by the City Council, April 11th, 1883. BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:— 1. Section 2 of the City By-Law, Chapter 1—intituled, "A By-Law amending the Law relating to Dogs and the Taxing thereof," is hereby amended by striking out the word "two" in the first line thereof, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "one"; and by striking out the word "four" in last line thereof, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "two". 2. The Dog Tax due for this present year, and all future Dog Tax shall be paid to the City Collector of this City, who shall register all Dogs, as required by the By-Law of said City, Chapter 23, amended by the By-Law relating to Dogs and the Taxing thereof, and mentioned perform all the duties by said last mentioned By-Law, imposed on the Clerk of the City Court.
