Regarding complaints of reductions in the school board budget, Councillor Zakem said, "The school board presented its budget to us; we passed it as such. We didn't cut it back or ask that it be cut back." He emphasized that the board was an independent body.

Chairman of public property committee, Councillor Gormley, reported work on the Victoria Park breakwater was proceeding ahead of schedule, and was expected to be completed by the end of the month.

Coun. MacNeill, finance committee chairman, said all property tax bills should be out this week. "We intend to collect all taxes as quickly as we can," he stated, adding that if warnings by the tax office were not heeded, legal action would be taken.

PARKING LOT

Council decided the city would assume control and management of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Trust parking lot on Grafton Street for the remainder of the year 1965, and turn over any profit to the Trust.

Mayor Walter Cox was given authority by council to negotiate with the provincial and federal governments for financial assistance for construction of approximately 100 federal-provincial housing units, part of the city's proposed low-rental housing project.

It was decided the week of May 16 to 22 would be proclaimed Clean-Up Week in the city. It was also resolved to retain Weston Tractor in a supervisory capacity with the City Recreation Council for the summer months.

A number of resolutions regarding acceptance of tenders was passed. They include the tender of Island Construction Co. Ltd. for street paving and patching at a price of \$83,928; of W.G. Barbour, Ltd., for rental of three dump trucks, at \$169 each per month and no pick-up truck at \$82 per month; of Square K Construction Co., Ltd., for operation of the teepee and garbage disposal at a price of \$14,867 per year; and of Douglas Brothers and Jones Ltd., for 800 gallons of paint at a price of \$1,403.

Late Mrs. John L. Beaton Was Active CWL Member

Mrs. John L. Beaton, Sherwood, died May 9 in the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, after an illness of seven weeks.

Mrs. Beaton, the former Irene Wisener of Waterville, was a member of St. Dunstan's Basilica Catholic Women's League and served on its executive. She was a charter member of St. Pius X Parish Council CWL and later held the office of president. An active member on the provincial CWL, she held the position of treasurer for two years.

Over the past several years, Mrs. Beaton had given wholeheartedly to the work of the local division of the Canadian Cancer Society, and served as a member of the provincial board of directors; as a member of the national grand council of the society, and was provincial chairman of the women's committee for the P.E.I. division. She also acted as co-ordinator for campaigns in the Parkdale-Sherwood areas.

She is survived by her husband, John L. Beaton, and sons, Augustus, of Sherwood, and Sterling of Ottawa; daughters, Mrs. A.R. Fischl, Ottawa, Mrs. Brian Potter, Sherwood and Margaret at home.

She also leaves her mother, Mrs. May Wisener of Moncton, N.B., and two sisters, Mrs. Arthur Monaghan, Moncton, and Mrs. Francis O'Donnell of Chatham, N.B.

Alberton Receives New Street Signs

ALBERTON — A total of 30 new street name signs were presented to the town during business carried out last night at the regular meeting of Alberton town council with Mayor Leard presiding and all councillors present except McNeill.

Mrs. H.W. Matthews, president of Alberton Women's Institute, Mrs. G.G. Bennett, and Mrs. C.H. Weeks attended the meeting to present the signs and also to further discuss the possibility of the town taking over the Women's Institute hall. The name signs are to be installed by the street committee.

It was noted that rural fire protection fees have not been paid by a number of communities and a further effort is to be made for their collection before certifying officers to the areas.

The police report showed one conviction under the highway traffic act, two under town parking laws and four disorderly conduct.

Artificial flowers are to be used in the street baskets this year and a sum of money was voted for this purpose. Flowers are to be planted again this year in front of the fire hall.

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Top Lobster Hauls Continuing In West

Catches by lobster fishermen in Prince County remain excellent while fishermen in Kings County continue to experience catches of over 600 pounds each at both Alberton and Tignish.

Officials at Tignish Fisheries estimate their total amount to be in the vicinity of 45,000 pounds Monday and this haul is considered the highest in years.

Queens County fishermen operating from the North Shore area still are experiencing ice conditions although some traps are set. There have been no reports as to whether or not they have landed any amount.

The South Shore fishermen are not experiencing any ice troubles but reports from that area remain quiet and no catches have been reported.

The lobster is on the market at 90 some cents cooked in Charlottetown and 80 cents alive in Summerside.

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
