Champs Of 10 Provinces To Compete For Tennis Crown

OTTAWA (CP)—Champions of 10 provinces will compete for the first time in the 11-year history of the Canadian junior tennis championships which open today.

A record entry of some 260 players from Canada and the United States will compete in the 10-day championships on the 16 courts of the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club in suburban Overbrook. Newfoundland became the last province to send its junior champions here, being represented by junior women's titlist Frances Walsh, 17, and junior men's only.

The championships will play more than 600 matches in quest of 23 titles, eight closed and 15 open, before the championships conclude Aug. 16.

The championships start with a closed competition for Canadians only, highlighted by interprovincial competitions among four teams — one each representing Quebec, Ontario, the four Atlantic provinces and the four western provinces. All closed competitions are for Canadians
