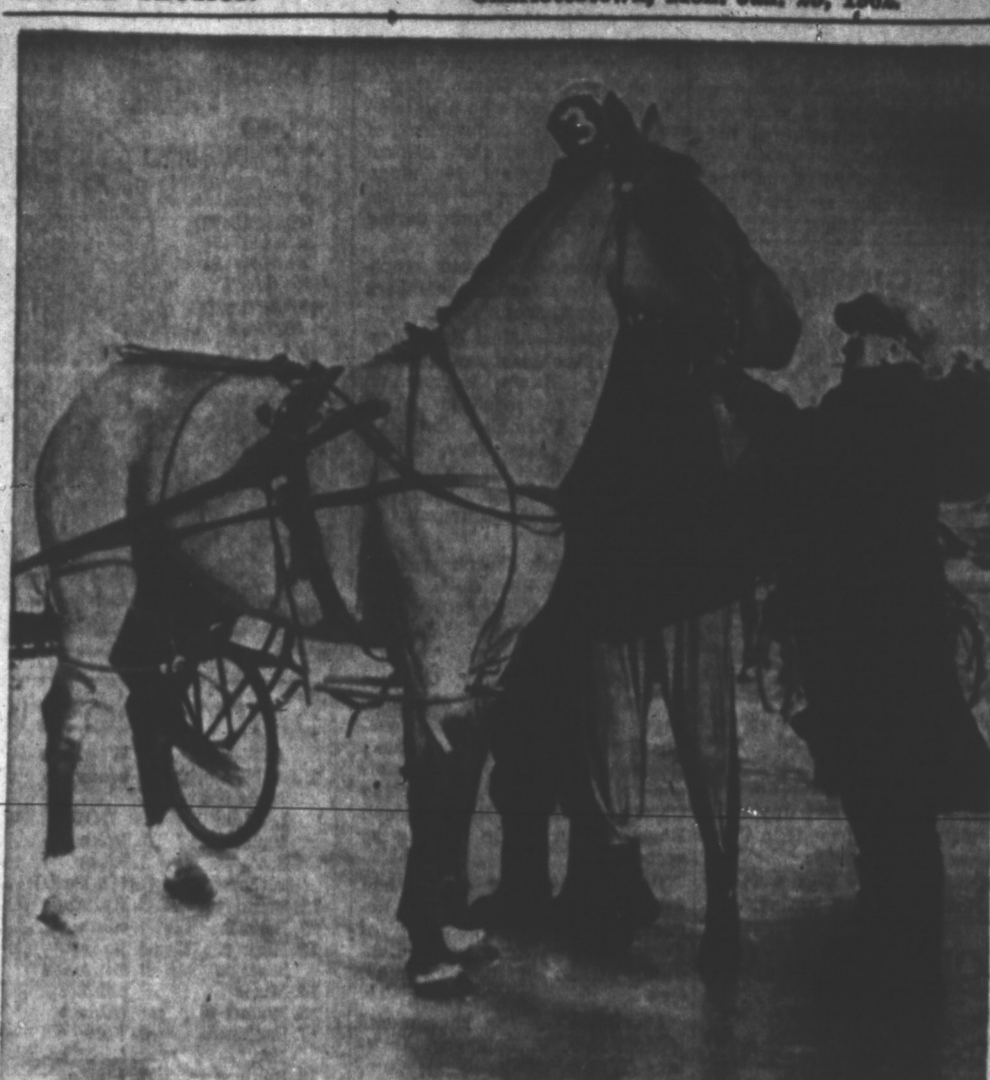

# Sympathize With Saints

We sympathize with the RDU hockey team; we think their argument for 4 points was sound (at least, Toronto St. Michaels operates under such an arrangement), we believe they would have been exciting contenders had they made the play-offs—yet we think the league executive did the right thing in turning down their request. If a mistake was made, it was at the time when the 2 points for a win was originally set, and should have been protested then. This making of rules and regulations a half-jump ahead of the action affected by such rules is ridiculous.

Rules should be drawn up when no one has any idea whom they will benefit. Actually, the Saints, in playing only a quarter of the games the other teams play should get 8 points if parity is to be achieved, but it would seem wise to insist on a team's playing at least half the games in order to gain admission to the league.

Being eliminated from a league in January is, to say the least, unusual. Saints are fortunate in having their inter-collegiate series, but the Evinrudes, had they been eliminated, would have faced over two months of league games to play. Two more teams will be eliminated in February. It is possible that two teams playing out of one rink will be all through for the season in the third week of February. The old principle of "the greatest good for the greatest number" seems to have taken quite a licking in the legislation passed by the solons of the ISHL.
