HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says it was mostly cloudy in the Maritimes Thursday evening. A few places reported snowbursts, and a few others reported light drizzle. A storm centered near Anticosti Island is moving north away from the district. Behind it pressure is rising over the Maritimes, and colder air is beginning to edge in from Quebec. Consequently today should be cloudy and colder with scattered snowbursts in all regions. Chiefly sunny and cold conditions are expected Saturday.

Former Teacher Well Known Here

The death occurred at the Wood Convalescent Home in Charlottetown, on Nov. 12 of Mrs. James Crichton, 4 Brighton Shore.

Mrs. Crichton, the former Mary M. Cameron was born in Liverpool, England in 1888. Orphaned at a very early age, she was brought up and educated in Banair, Scotland.

As a school teacher her influence has molded many a prominent citizen in Scotland and also in Nova Scotia, where she came after her marriage in 1918. During World War One, Mrs. Crichton returned to Scotland and came back with her husband and three children to Dartmouth, N.S., where they resided for many years.

A keen traveller, Mrs. Crichton spent two years in South

America where her husband was employed.

For the last twelve years Mrs. Crichton had wintered in Daytona Beach, Florida, and spent her summers at Brighton Shore, Charlottetown. In these places she is mourned by a host of friends.

An ardent gardener, Mrs. Crichton also took a great interest in politics and community affairs and was a member of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown.

Besides her husband, she is survived by two daughters, Maureen, Mrs. Gordon White, Charlottetown, Evelyn, Mrs. Donald Lidstone, Summerside and eleven grandchildren.

A daughter, Jean, Mrs. Alan Holman pre-deceased her in 1950.

Fund Hits 77 Per Cent Of Goal

The Prince Edward Island United Fund Appeal to date has reached a total of \$216,373 which is 77 per cent of the objective of \$282,426, it was learned last night.

Charlottetown has raised \$102,283 which is 77 per cent of the quota set for this year. The Federal Service division has raised 69 per cent of its quota of \$16,022, while the provincial employees have reached the 89 per cent mark with \$13,400 raised or pledged. The town of Summerside has 82 per cent of its quota or \$29,656.

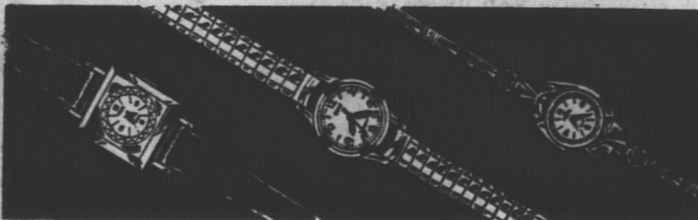
