An Apology For Mr. Welsh.

MR. WELSH'S latest exploit in the House of Commons, to which we referred yesterday, illustrates how our Province is suffering in consequence of the blunder made at the last election in sending six Grits to Ottawa.

The apology offered by Mr. Mills for Mr. Welsh does not help him very much. The hon. member for Bothwell said:—

"If this money was for a proper object and in the public interest, then it seems to me it is a most improper proceeding to strike the estimate out simply because my hon. friend (Mr. Welsh) at one o'clock in the morning used language that was not conciliatory to the Minister of Public Works."

We do not know of any code by which a man can escape the responsibility of his words "at one o'clock in the morning" more than any other hour out of the twenty-four, but it is not hard to understand the nature of the apology made by Mr. Mills.

It seems that neither Mr. Laurier, Mr. Mills, nor Sir Richard Cartwright, who spoke after Mr. Welsh, understood that the vote of \$1,000 was for repairs only, and was not for the extension, which was estimated to cost \$3,500.

Sir Richard Cartwright, however, formed a correct opinion of what harm would certainly result from Mr. Welsh's opposition to the vote, and its consequent withdrawal, for he said:

"It is tolerably certain that if this money was required for necessary repairs, and if it is not now expended, this country will shortly be put to a greater expense to put that harbor in order."

This might go without saying. And the same remark is true of the public loss arising from the deterioration of material already paid for, and which cannot now be used.

A Pioneer in Steamboating.

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF THE LATE CAPTAIN EVANS.

Capt. Evander Evans was born in 1820, at Westcock, where the Evans family have lived since the early settlement of the country. Capt. Evans was one of the pioneers as well as one of the best known steamboat men in Canada.

Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island met at Summerside on Wednesday, the 14th inst. The congregation of Tignish, Montrose and Elmdale petitioned for moderation in a call to one to be their minister, guaranteeing a salary on their part of \$600, and asking that application be made to the Augmentation Committee for a grant of \$150.

The session records of Belfast, Valleyfield, Clifton, St. Peter's and Brackley Point Roads, Tignish, Montrose and Elmdale, Bedouque and Summerside, and Long River and Kensington were examined by a Committee and found to be correctly kept, except that in some instances they did not conform to the rules of the Book, 179-188.

The Moderator was ordered to attest the records in terms of the report. Rev. G. McMullan and J. R. Coffin having intimated that they could not attend the meeting of the General Assembly, Rev. A. A. McKenzie and E. Gillis were appointed to fill their places. Messrs. W. T. Huggan and M. Campbell, ruling elders, also resigned their appointments as Commissioners.

A committee, consisting of Rev. D. B. McLeod, W. Tufts and H. Dickie, was appointed to convey to the Women's Foreign Missionary Society (then in session) the sympathy of the Presbytery and their recognition of the good work being done by that body.

The Clerk submitted the complete report of statistics together with a table of average contributions of the various congregations within the bounds. On motion, the report was approved and ordered to be printed and circulated.

On motion, power was granted to the moderators of sessions, in the vacant congregations of Cardigan, Alberton, Strathalbyn, Caledonia, Richmond Bay East and Dundas, to moderate in a call at such time as the congregations may be ready for such a step.

Rev. Mr. McMillan reported that the Augmentation Committee had granted all supplements applied for except Covehead, that, as this congregation had always been a special case, the application had been laid upon the table until such a time as the Presbytery should visit the congregation. In accordance therewith, the Presbytery agreed to meet at Covehead, on Tuesday, June 3, at 7 p. m., for business, and at 8 p. m. for visitation of the congregation.
